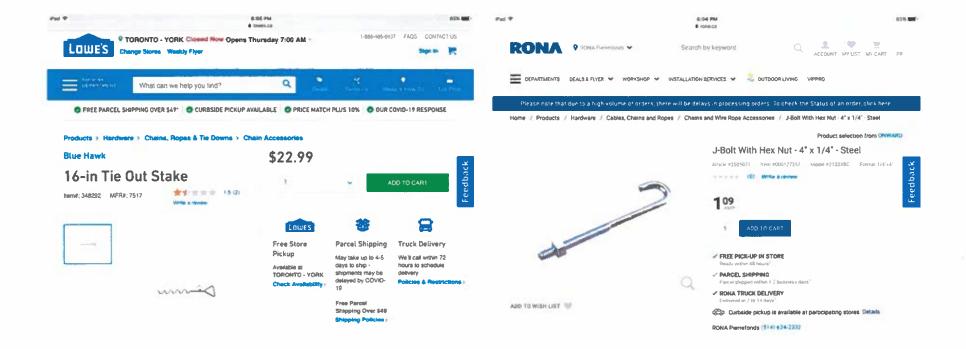


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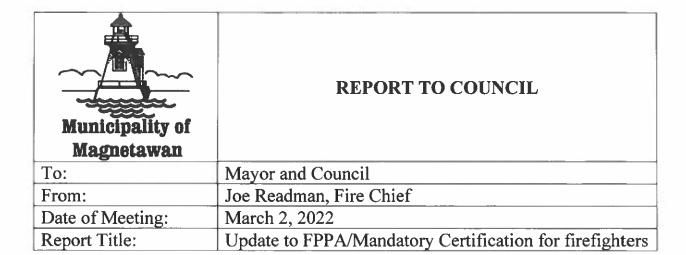


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NOTES

- We'd like to make two pantries.
 - a) The smaller as presented with a 30" x 18" footprint for Dry Goods. (Single door hinges on left?)
 - b) The larger is abouit 20% bigger with an ~36" x 213/4" footprint and the height scaled —more or less—proportionately to the smaller one for Canned Goods.
- 2. Infographic panel is 12"x 30". See photo, mounted between to pantries.
- 3. For ease of access the cupboard openings should be as wide as possible
- 4. Peaks will be used to identify the community pantry with a touch of branding.
- 5. No opening for empty plastic bags
- 6. Door glazing Lexan?
- 7. 3.0"± roof overhang front & back with proportional on left and right sides
- 8. Can the roof be red metal/steel
- 9. The doors of each pantry should clear the drip edge of the roof
- 10. For cooling/ventilation, please add a vent at the back of each
- 11. For wheelchair access, the lower shelf should be 15.0" off the ground
- 12. The spaces between shelves for the smaller pantry, should be between 10" to 12" to accommodate 2-28 ounce cans stacked (~ 9\%").
- 13 Bass could be made of 4 x 6 pressure treated lumber
- 14. Each pantry should be screwed together (No nails).
- 15 Shelving needs to be screwed down to prevent their nefarious removal.
- 16. For ease of cleaning the interior, we should spray it white.
- 17. A panel on each unit should be easily removable for access to peak/roof area to install future solar LED lighting or 12Volt electrification.
- 18. Colours the smaller pantry will be yellow (close to Pantone 107) with a white door. The larger pantry will be orange/tangerine (close to Pantone 716) with white doors. 80th colours are drawn from Redeemer's logo.
- 20. How might we light with Solar or 12v LED equivalent?



Recommendation: THAT Council receives and approves this report as presented.

Background: In 2018 the Government of Ontario created and tried to enact a mandatory certification Regulation for all municipal and unorganized fire departments within the province, based around the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA). It was quickly identified by Fire Chiefs and Municipal Councils that this Regulation was unachievable in the timelines provided. The regulation was revoked later that year, with a clear message this Regulation would return.

The Minister of the Solicitor General currently is proposing a new mandatory certification model, this time with participation from the Ontario Association of Fire Chiefs in its creation. This Regulation allows a department to review their own Establishing and Regulating bylaw and only certify to the level of service Council has approved through that bylaw. This Regulation was out for public comment until February 28, 2022.

This Regulation will be an addition to the Fire Prevention and Protection Act 1997.

Financial Implication: With the success of our Regional Training Officer agreement and program, this new regulation will have no additional costs. Magnetawan Fire fully anticipated and prepared for the return of certification and has actively been training to the NFPA Standard.

Conclusion: After reviewing the new Regulation I feel we will have no issue meeting the minimum levels of certification by the dates outlined.

Mandatory certification for fire protection services

Definition

1. In this Regulation,

"NFPA" means the National Fire Protection Association.

Mandatory certification

- 2. (1) Every municipality, and every fire department in a territory without municipal organization, must ensure that its firefighters perform a fire protection service set out in Column 1 of Table 1 only if, on or after the corresponding day specified in Column 3 of that Table,
 - (a) the firefighter performing the fire protection service is certified, at a minimum, to the corresponding certification standard set out in Column 2 of that Table; or

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- (b) this Regulation provides that the certification standard referred to in clause (a) does not apply with respect to the firefighter.
- (2) The certification must be,
 - (a) provided by the Fire Marshal; or
 - (b) an accreditation from the International Fire Safety Accreditation Congress (IFSAC), or a Pro Board seal, that is recognized by the Fire Marshal as equivalent to the certification provided by the Fire Marshal.

Exceptions

- 3. (1) A certification standard set out in item 1 or 2 of Table 1 does not apply with respect to a firefighter who,
 - (a) is performing a service that is within the scope of that item;
 - (b) has been a firefighter for no more than 24 months; and
 - (c) is operating under the supervision of a firefighter certified to that standard.
- (2) A certification standard set out in Column 2 of Table 1 does not apply with respect to a firefighter who is,
 - (a) temporarily assigned to perform a different fire protection service for which a different minimum certification is required; and
 - (b) operating under the supervision of a firefighter who has obtained the certification corresponding to the fire protection service or services being delivered.
- (3) If a firefighter was previously certified under this Regulation for an item listed in Table 1, that certification continues to be valid even if the requirements for obtaining that certification are subsequently updated or changed.

Transition

- 4. (1) Subject to subsection (2), a certification standard set out in item 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, 7, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 17 or 18 of Table 1 does not apply with respect to a firefighter if the Fire Marshal issues the firefighter a letter of compliance with the certification standard in accordance with this section.
- (2) The Fire Marshal shall issue a letter of compliance with a certification standard to a firefighter if,
 - (a) the firefighter has been performing the fire protection service that the standard corresponds to since at least,
 - (i) January 1, 2021, in the case of a certification standard set out in item 1, 2, 3, 5, 6 or 7,
 - (ii) January 1, 2020, in the case of a certification standard set out in item 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14 or 15, or
 - (iii) January 1, 2019, in the case of a certification standard set out in item 17 or 18;
 - (b) before September 30, 2023, the firefighter's municipality, or fire department in an area without municipal organization, provides the Fire Marshal with information, such as training records, to demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Fire Marshal that the firefighter, through past training and experience, has obtained the requisite knowledge and requisite skills associated with the corresponding standard; and
 - (c) the Fire Marshal is satisfied with the information provided under clause (b).

Proposed Firefighter Certification Regulation

Presented to: Municipal Representatives

Date: February 18, 2022



Purpose

- To provide an overview of the proposed Firefighter Certification regulation, which is currently available for review and comment on the Ontario Regulatory Registry until February 28, 2022; and,
- To address questions related to the proposed regulation.



Firefighter Training and Certification: Current State

- The Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997 (FPPA) does not set minimum standards for firefighter training and certification (See Appendix A). Municipalities, as the employer, are required to provide information, instruction and supervision to protect the health and safety of workers under Section 25(2)(a) of the Occupational Health and Safety Act, 1990.
 - Ontario Regulation 379/18: Firefighter Certification, which established mandatory
 National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) certification requirements for firefighters in
 ten specific roles, was revoked in 2018 prior to coming into force.
- Training practices vary across fire departments in municipalities and territories without municipal organization in Ontario.
- Ontario provides certification testing for 45 National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) levels of certification and is accredited through the International Fire Service Accreditation Congress (IFSAC) and the Pro Board.
- There is a lack of flexibility in NFPA testing practices.
 - Prerequisites under the current model do not allow for flexibility or customization of training to local needs and service levels, resulting in training pressures on volunteer fire services.

Goal: To develop a standardized approach to firefighter training, which **protects firefighters and increases public safety** while providing flexibility for the local needs and service levels of municipalities across Ontario.





Key Considerations for Firefighter Certification



Protecting the Health and Safety of Firefighters

In the absence of provincial regulations specific to firefighters, they might not have the appropriate level of training to meet risks associated with service levels established in their municipality.



Level of Service

Stakeholders have raised concerns about minimum standards that would require training beyond the level of service being delivered, as well as exposure to liability if all firefighters are not certified to the minimum standard.



Addressing Legacy Provisions

Proposal would enable current fire service personnel to be certified to their current level and consider any time required for municipalities to adhere to the regulation.



Modernization of Firefighter Training

Proposal would create opportunities to better support training delivery and certification including the option to certify firefighters to higher standards.



Overview of the Proposed Regulation

The Ministry of the Solicitor General is proposing to file a regulation under the FPPA to establish mandatory certification requirements for fire protection services.

Input from municipal and fire safety stakeholders (see Appendix B) informed the proposed regulation, including the implementation considerations.

Flexibility	Training
 The proposed approach would provide flexibility to meet local training needs based on the level of fire protection service set by municipal council. 	Many fire departments already train to a higher standard than the proposed minimum certification requirements.
 If the local level of service exceeds the minimum standard set out in the proposed regulation, the Office of the Fire Marshal would continue to provide certification to full NFPA standards at no cost. 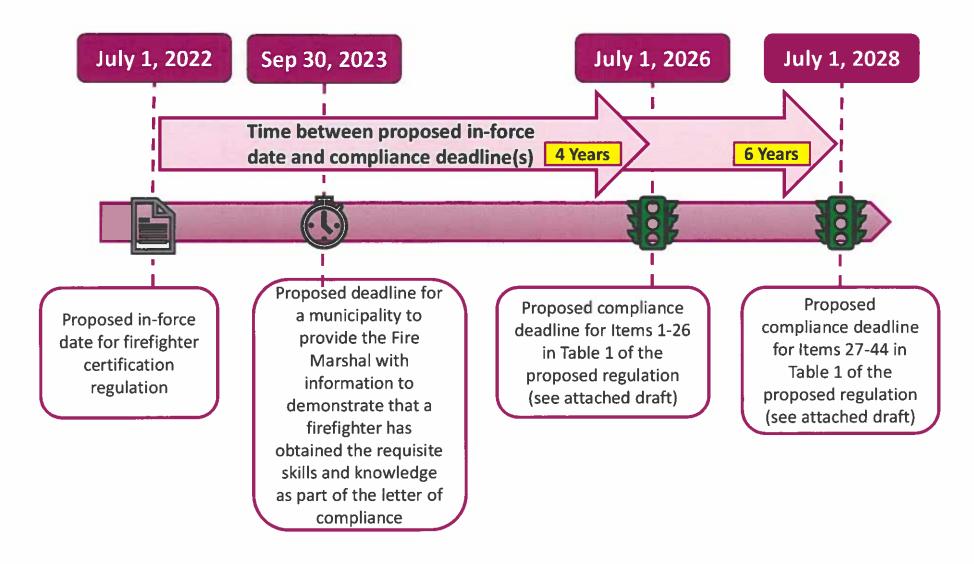
Implementation Considerations, cont.

Compliance	Administration
 Staggered timelines are proposed to help ensure fire departments have sufficient time to: Certify new firefighters (2026 for most fire protection services; 2028 for technical rescue). Submit "legacy" applications for eligible firefighters (would be able to apply until September 2023). To meet the new requirements in the proposed regulation, municipalities and their fire departments are encouraged to plan out the next four to six years of training. The FM has the power to monitor, review and advise municipalities respecting the provision of fire protection services. This includes designated OFM sections monitoring/reviewing the requirements of minimum certification. The OFM would take a phased approach to enforcement: Review concerns with the Fire Chief, Address concerns with the CAO, Failing the above points, the FM would consider additional options to communicate to the public. The Fire Marshal reserves the right to: Use enforcement measures available under the FPPA Refer the issue to the MLTSD given the potential impact to firefighter health and safety 	 Some administrative costs are estimated based on the potential value of time it may take municipal fire departments to: Familiarize themselves with the regulation. Maintain training records. Complete one-time legacy applications (estimated one hour per application). The estimated range (between \$290 to \$1400 per fire department) would depend on the size of the department and number of legacy applications for eligible firefighters. This estimated cost range does not capture any associated training costs which are expected to be minimal as most fire departments are anticipated to already be training to the service level established by their municipality.

The Office of the Fire Marshal is developing resources to support implementation.

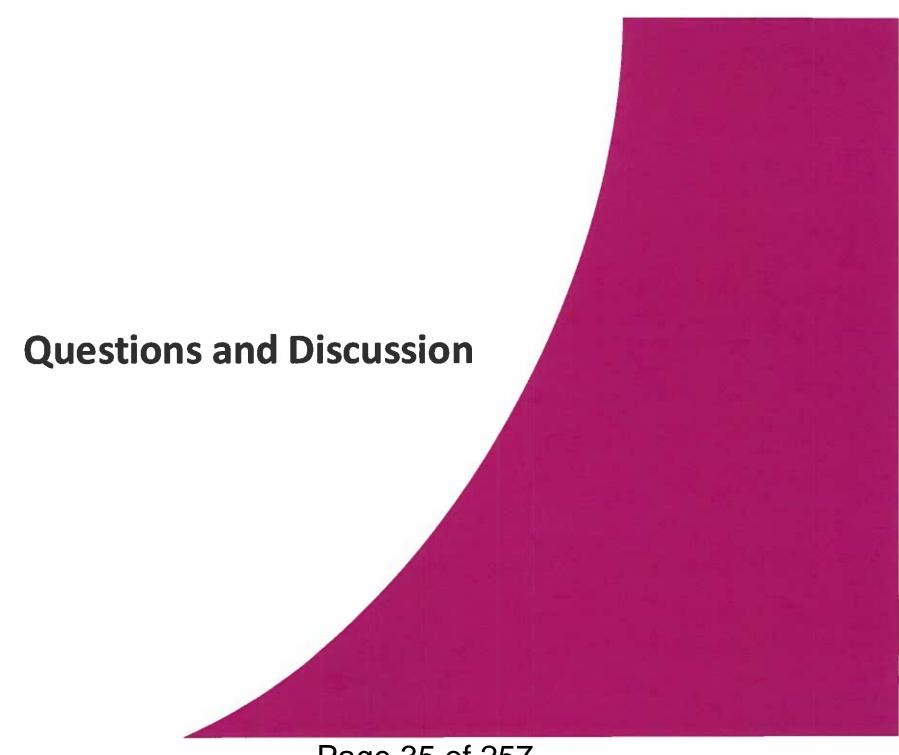




Next Steps

Report Title:	Truck #20 PWS Replacement

Recommendation: That Council receives and approves this report as presented and authorizes Staff to replace the Public Works Superintendent's Truck #21 with a 2021 1500 Classic St Quad Cab Truck in stock at MacLangs for \$47,724 (plus snow tires \$1,500) plus HST and to include this amount in the 2022 budget.

Background: This report is to update Council on the task to compare the cost and differences between a Quad Cab (formerly known as an extended cab which has 4 doors and less leg room than a Crew Cab) and Crew Cab (4 doors and the most leg room) Pickup Truck as directed by Council at the January 19th, 2022, Draft Budget Meeting.

The main purpose of the truck is for Road Patrol, Winter Maintenance Inspections, Public Works Emergencies, Project Inspections and Site Meetings with the Contractors and the general public. For the most part the truck has 1-2 occupants but on occasion depending on the project and/or emergency there could be between 3-4 occupants in the vehicle at one time which is the reasoning for the purchase of a Quad Cab Truck as it would be more convenient for space and transportation of equipment and will result in a higher resale value.

Staff reached out to the local Ford, Dodge, and Chevrolet Dealers. There is no longer a 2 door Extended Cab produced by the Big 3. The alternative would be to go with a Regular 2 Door sized Cab with an 8' Box and either a large toolbox and/or cap. Currently Pickup Truck # 21 only has a 6' box which is undersized for signposts and/or brush and debris that is regularly picked up.

Evaluation: At the time of this Report, Staff only had two dealerships respond: MacLangs (Dodge Dealership) and Bray Motors (Chevrolet) both in Sundridge

MacLang Dodge: Regarding the difference of the Extended cab to a Crew cab for the Dodge Ram 1500 series is somewhat minimal overall; however, the notable differences are that an Quad Cab offers a smaller seating area after of the front row seating whereas the Crew Cab offers more being an additional 9.6 "of rear seat legroom. For the Quad Cab the Headroom measures 39.2" with a Leg room of 35.6" in comparison to the Crew Cab which is a Headroom of 39.8" and a Legroom of 45.2" The additional space would be handy if mobilising a full Crew and gear to a jobsite. Regarding the length of the box this only comes in 6'4", for an 8' Box you need to step up to the 2500 series and above and or back to a Regular sized 2 Door Cab Pickup Truck.

Brays Motors: Regarding the difference of the Extended cab to a Crew cab for the Chevrolet of the Double Cab to a Crew Cab the rear Headroom measure 39.88" and the Legroom measuring 35.24". In comparison to the Crew Cab in which the Headroom measures 40.12" and the Legroom 43.40". As mentioned, the additional space would be handy if mobilising a full Crew and gear to a jobsite. Regarding the length of the box, they only come in 6", for an 8' Box you need to go to a Regular sized 2 Door Cab.

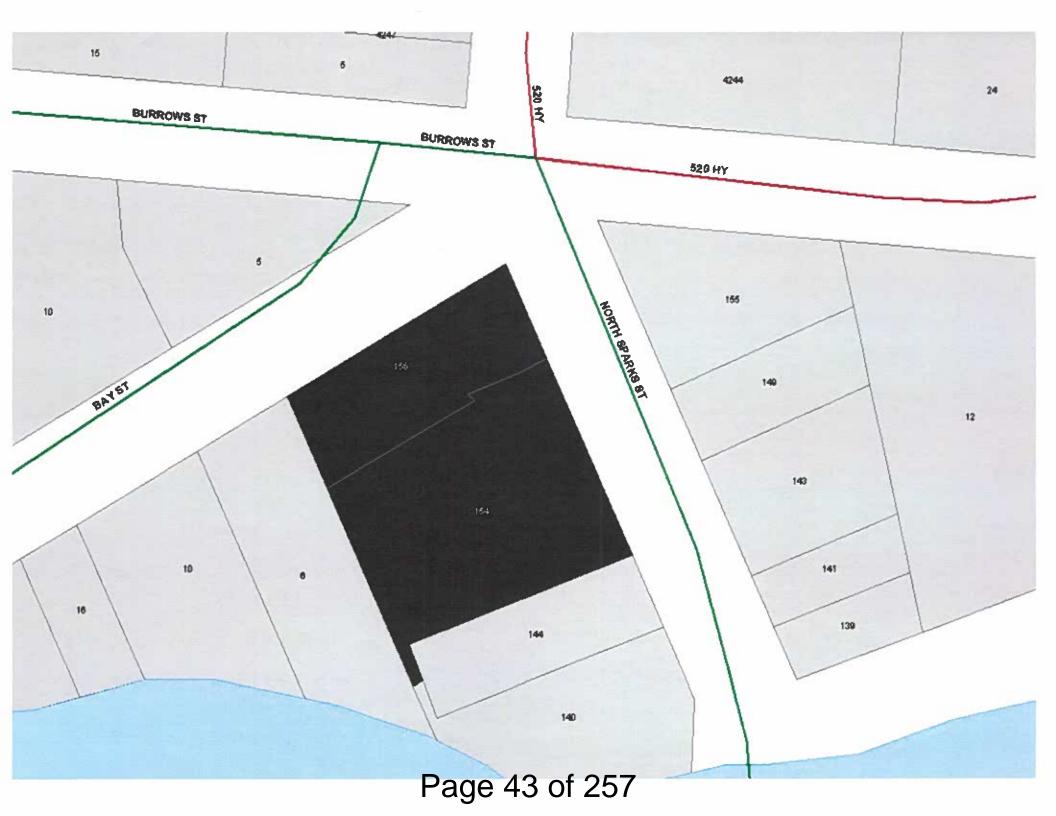

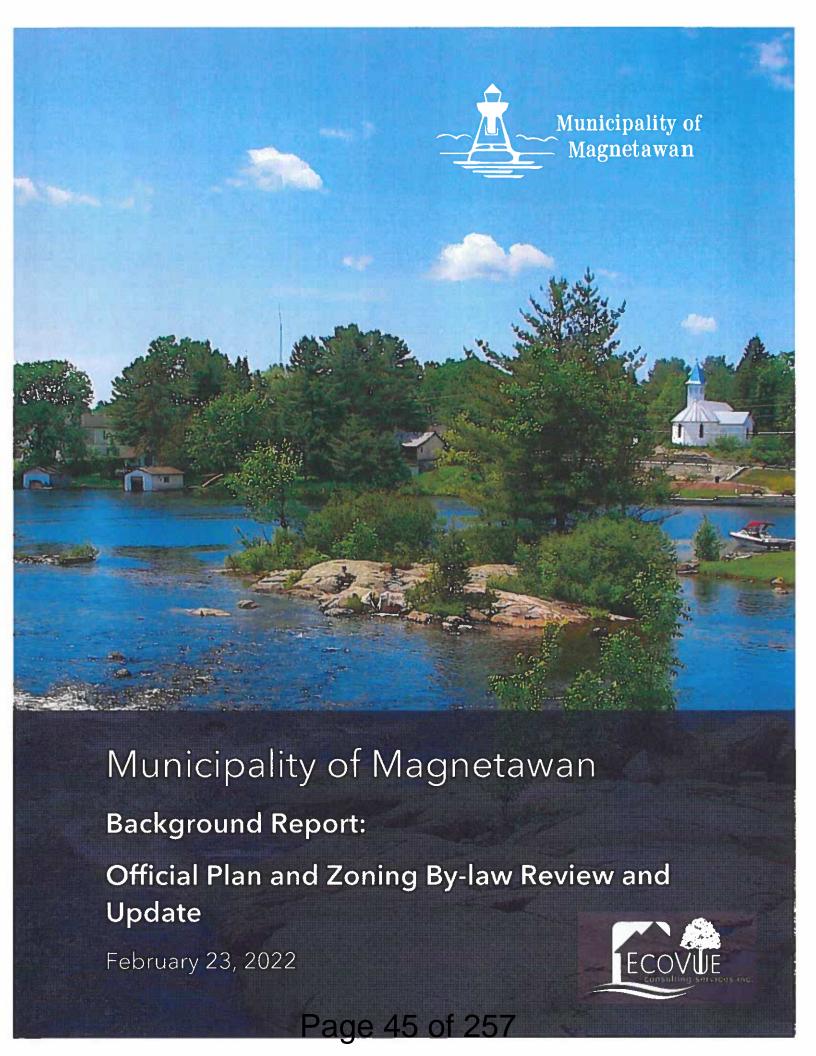






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1.0 Introduction

In mid-2021, the Municipality of Magnetawan initiated the process to update the Municipality of Magnetawan Official Plan (MMOP) and Zoning By-law. As part of that process, EcoVue Consulting Services Inc. (EcoVue), in tandem with Municipality's OP Update Steering Committee, have been collecting background information that will inform the changes to be made to the MMOP. This report will provide a summary of information that has been reviewed and discuss the direction for the new Official Plan and Zoning By-law.

1.1 Official Plan Update

An Official Plan is the primary tool for guiding land use planning within a municipality. A municipal Official Plan sets out policies regarding how land in a community will be used and establishes a framework of goals and objectives that direct growth within a 20-year horizon. Although it is focused primarily on land use, the Official Plan must be all-inclusive in its direction by including economic, environmental, and cultural themes within the goals and objectives. These goals and objectives provide direction to municipal staff and Council, landowners, developers and the community at large.

The proposed update to the Municipality of Magnetawan Official Plan (MMOP) will be based on an outlook to 2042, and provide an update to the current Official Plan that was adopted by Council and approved by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing (MMAH) in 2012. A number of changes to Provincial policies have occurred since the current OP was adopted in 2010 – most notably, updates to the *Planning Act*, the 2020 Provincial Policy Statement, and the A Place to Grow: Growth Plan for Northern Ontario (2011). Modifications to the MMOP will be made to bring the Plan into conformity with these documents, where necessary.

As required under Section 26 of the *Planning Act*, the Official Plan Update project was introduced to Council on July 21, 2021. A Stakeholder Open House was held on October 20, 2021, where the project was introduced to important community groups and initial comments, concerns, and priorities for the OP/ZBL update were gathered. A Public Open House was held on November 18, 2021, to obtain preliminary input from residents.

This Background Report provides a summary of comments received during the initial public consultation.

The information provided in this report should not be considered exhaustive. It is our intention to continue to gather information throughout the Official Plan Update in order to ensure that the final document encapsulates all policies and regulations, including those that may be implemented during the update process.

Further public and community stakeholder sessions will be held in the coming months to solicit comments and questions from residents and stakeholders. Comments and suggestions from residents and community stakeholders will influence the introduction of new policies and updates to existing polices. Once the Official Plan final draft is created, a Statutory Public Meeting will take place for the Plan to be presented to the public and to allow for a review of the document.





1.2 Zoning By-law Update

In addition to the update of the Magnetawan Official Plan, EcoVue and municipal staff will be working together to update the Municipality's Zoning By-law. A Zoning By-law implements the Official Plan policies, goals and objectives by regulating the use of land within a community.

The Zoning By-law regulates how land may be used, where buildings and structures can be located, lot sizes, setback requirements, building heights and parking requirements. In addition to a new text document, the update will also include the introduction of Zoning Schedules (maps) that identify zones across the Municipality. The zones on the schedule will correspond with a set of regulations outlined in the By-law.







2.0 Municipality of Magnetawan - Regional Context

The Municipality of Magnetawan covers an area of approximately 532 km² located along the shores of the Magnetawan River in the Almaguin Highlands region of the Parry Sound District. The Municipality is a single-tier municipality situated along Highway 520, approximately 45 minutes north-west of Huntsville, and 1 hour south of North Bay.

The main Village of Magnetawan features a traditional downtown core surrounded by low-density residential development, mostly in the form of single detached dwellings. There are a variety of other uses located within the Village, such as commercial (e.g. Algonquin Fine Foods), institutional (e.g. the Magnetawan Historical Museum), and industrial uses. The other rural settlement area within the Municipality of Magnetawan is the Hamlet of Ahmic Harbour, which hosts a variety of commercial/tourist, residential, and industrial uses.

According to the 2021 Census, the population of Magnetawan is 1,753. This represents a 20.7% increase from the 2016 census. According to the 2016 Census, the median age of residents within the Municipality is 57.4 years old, 17 years older than the Provincial average.







3.0 Official Plan for the Municipality of Magnetawan, 2012

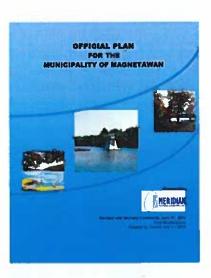
Section 26.1 of the *Planning Act* that requires the municipality to revise its Official Plan no less frequently than 10 years after it comes into effect as a new official plan, and every five years thereafter, unless the plan has been replaced by another new official plan. This policy is in place to ensure that the Official Plan:

- a) conforms with provincial plans, including the Provincial Policy Statement 2020 (PPS) and the Growth Plan for Northern Ontario, 2011 (Growth Plan), or does not conflict with them, as the case may be:
- b) has regard to matters of provincial interests; and
- c) that it conforms to other provincial policy documents issued under the *Planning Act*.

The Municipality of Magnetawan Official Plan has not been updated since it was adopted and granted final approval in 2012.

There have been a number of changes to Provincial plans and policy documents since the approval of the plan 10 years ago.

To ensure conformity with the PPS, policies to be addressed in the revised Official Plan include, but are not limited to:



- Policies to ensure the adequate provision of employment opportunities and the adequate provision of a full range of housing, including affordable housing;
- Policies to establish minimum targets for affordable housing;
- Policies to support the conservation of features of significant architectural, cultural, historical, archaeological or scientific interest;
- Policies to encourage public service facilities to be co-located in community hubs; and
- Policies that identify goals, objectives and actions to mitigate greenhouse gas emissions and to provide for adaptation to a changing climate, including through increasing resiliency.

EcoVue has reviewed the current Official Plan to determine areas that can be improved through the update process, including (but not limited to):

- Determining the feasibility of policies for diversified housing options within the Municipality, including (but not limited to) tiny homes, row housing, etc.;
- 2. Identifying and promoting employment land districts (see the Provincial Policy Statement section below) in order to provide an adequate land inventory for possible future employment uses (e.g. manufacturing, prestige industrial, etc.);
- 3. Providing the greatest possible flexibility for redevelopment within the floodplains of hydrologic features within the Municipality, including the Magnetawan River floodplain;
- 4. Providing clarity relating to Short Term Accommodations, and provide the Municipality with the authority to require a license to operate short term rentals such as "Airbnbs";





- 5. Incorporating policies within the Official Plan which provide Council the flexibility to create and implement a Community Improvement Plan (CIP) within Magnetawan;
- **6.** Clarifying policies related to Natural Heritage and Natural Hydrologic Features, including updating technical requirements when proposing new land uses or buildings/structures; and
- 7. Mapping improving on the existing Official Plan schedule by incorporating more detailed mapping schedules for greater clarity regarding general development policies.

From an amendment perspective, the Municipality has not amended the MMOP since adoption in 2012.





Additional Residential Dwellings

 Public seems to generally support the creation of Additional Residential Dwellings (commonly referred to as Secondary Dwellings) on residential properties; however, with requests for specific provisions (some of which are conflicting):

"I think that second dwellings are a good idea on the main street. For example, I think that apartments should be allowed to be built in the hotel space above the Grill & Grocery. This would help allow the business to succeed in the off season. As well on some of the lots that are at 1/2 an acre the municipality could allow the lot to be subdivided for a second dwelling. This may help ensure the families inhabit the village, keeping our school and businesses functioning. In former years, families used to be much bigger. Families often have only 1 or 2 children. So it makes sense to allow properties that are 1/2 an acre to be subdivided so that two home could be built on them";

"My Ahmic cottage owners have had rooms above boathouses. I'm in favour of this provided the boathouse room has a compostable toilet (or some other green solution). I am not in favour of a second house or trailer on a 1acre lot, eg 10 George Street, Magnetawan. If the property is 2acres or larger, I have less concern. Septic tanks and beds need room to function properly. No townhouses or semi-detached! I moved here to get away from that and have some privacy".

Therefore, clarification on lot requirements will be required if Additional Residential Dwellings are to be supported in the OP/ZBL Update.

Tiny Homes

 Similar to Additional Residential Dwellings, residents seem to be supportive, but with specific provisions:

"There shouldn't be restrictions on how small you can build but definitely on the number of dwelling units per lot (or lot size for larger lots). I wouldn't want to see essentially 'subdivisions' pop up where at one time only one more typically sized building would be allowed. There should be reasonable limits on the number of dwellings allowed on a lot based on the size of the lot".

Residents have also expressed concern with regulating Tiny Homes:

"I don't think it makes sense to have different regulations for different types of dwellings. Look at trailers are dwelling units but are not assessed as such for property tax purposes. Different regulations for different size dwellings opens the door for litigation, community friction, enforcement issues."

Environmental stewardship

 Residents expressed concern with development adjacent to natural features such as wetlands and lakes. In particular, residents on the major lakes in the Municipality (Ahmic, Cecebe, and Horn) are concerned with lake water quality and over-development of the shoreline.





o There is also concern with tree cutting, and the potential impacts of uncontrolled tree clearing on private land

Support for local businesses

- o Residents want more services (health, social, financial, etc.) within the Municipality in order to attract new residents, which will, in turn, bolster the local business community.
- o There is support for a municipal grant or incentivization system in order to attract more business to the Village.

We will continue to expand this list through public consultation throughout the review and update process.







7.0 Mapping Updates

As a part of the Official Plan and Zoning By-law update, revisions will be made to the Land Use maps (schedules) of the Municipality of Magnetawan Official Plan and Zoning By-law.

The revised land use Schedule for the MMOP is based on Schedule A to the current Official Plan, and provides some additional designations. Proposed designations identified on Schedule "A" to the Official Plan include the Core Area (Downtown), Employment Areas, Future Development, and Environmental Protection.

The revised Zoning By-law schedules, using the current Zoning Schedules, will identify and assign additional zones, where necessary, to all properties within the Municipality based on existing uses and the overarching land use designation in the MMOP.

Both the revised Official Plan schedules and Zoning By-law schedules will be made available when the draft documents are circulated for review.





8.0 Conclusions

Official Plans are the primary guiding land use planning tool in a municipality. The Official Plan provides a framework of goals and objectives to direct growth. It is important to update them to reflect the most current goals and visions of the Village as well as the current provincial plans.

There are many policies and regulations within provincial, municipal or agency documents and guidelines that the municipality must address as part of the Official Plan and Zoning By-law update. The information provided in this report is not exhaustive. It is our intention to continue to gather information throughout the Official Plan and Zoning By-law update process to ensure the Official Plan and Zoning By-law encapsulate all polices and regulations, as well as the general goals and objectives of the residents and stakeholders. At this point, the information obtained in our initial meeting has provided us with a strong basis for conducting future stakeholder and roundtable sessions.

We look forward to gathering further information and integrating new ideas into draft policies as the Official Plan and Zoning By-law update process continues.

BY-LAW NO. 2022 -

Being a By-law to establish a Committee of Adjustment for the Municipality of Magnetawan for 2022

WHEREAS Section 44(1) of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter P.13, authorizes a municipality to constitute and appoint a Committee of Adjustment;

AND WHEREAS Section 44(3) of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter P.13, the members of the committee who are members of a municipal council shall be appointed annually;

AND WHEREAS Section 45 (1) The committee of adjustment, upon the application of the owner of any land, building or structure affected by any by-law that is passed under section 34 or 38, or a predecessor of such sections, or any person authorized in writing by the owner, may, despite any other Act, authorize such minor variance from the provisions of the by-law, in respect of the land, building or structure or the use thereof, as in its opinion is desirable for the appropriate development or use of the land, building or structure, if in the opinion of the committee the general intent and purpose of the by-law and of the official plan, if any, are maintained;

AND WHEREAS Section 45 (3) A council that has constituted a committee of adjustment may by by-law empower the committee of adjustment to grant minor variances from the provisions of any by-law of the municipality that implements an official plan, or from such by-laws of the municipality as are specified and that implement an official plan, and when a committee of adjustment is so empowered subsection (1) applies with necessary modifications. R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13, s. 45 (3);

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Municipality of Magnetawan hereby enacts as follows:

- 1. **THAT** the following persons, all of whom are members of Council, are hereby appointed as its members for the 2022 calendar year until the inauguration of the newly elected Council:
 - Sam Dunnett
 - Tim Brunton
 - John Hetherington
 - Brad Kneller
 - Wayne Smith
- 2. THAT the Committee of Adjustment shall be hereby empowered with the authority to grant minor variances from the provisions of any by-law of the municipality that implements an Official Plan.
- 3. That the Clerk of the Municipality of Magnetawan is hereby appointed as the Secretary-Treasurer of the Committee of Adjustment. The Clerk may delegate to any employee of the Municipality of Magnetawan all, or a portion of, the duties of Secretary-Treasurer of the Committee of Adjustment.
- 4. **THAT** this By-law shall come into force and effect on January 01, 2022.

Dear Members of Council,

I write out of concern for the condition of the road allowance that connects eastern and western parts of the current Chapman Drive like the hypotenuse of a triangle. This road allowance was the originally named Chapman Drive, and is still so named on Registered Plan M-503 (1981). At one point a dump was created in the road allowance, about mid-way, on both the north and south sides of the original roadway. To this day the rubbish remaining—largely rusting metal and broken glass—is an eyesore for those who walk the trail on the former roadway. Moreover, the dump may constitute an environmental and health hazard.

The dumping ground is not only an ugly blot on the wooded area that bounds the trail, but also exists contrary to the By-laws of the Municipality. The rusting metal and glass meet the definition of "rubbish" in the By-laws, and the continuing existence of this rubbish contravenes section 3.1.1 of the By-laws.

The rusting "heavy metal"—tin, iron and steel—likely constitutes a polluting factor for the Magnetawan waterways. Reading a recent article, "Heavy metal pollution in the environment and their toxicological effects on humans," has raised my concern about this likelihood.² While it would not be industrial-level contamination, rain and snowmelt must be carrying elements of the rusting metals into the water table and ultimately to the creek that empties into L. Cecebe near the junction of Highway 520 and Chapman Dr. West. This cannot be something for which the Municipality would want to carry continuing responsibility.

I am requesting that Council take action to bring about the clean-up of this dump. I believe that many of us who walk the trail would be willing to assist in aspects of such a project. In this time of global ecological crisis, what we can do locally to prevent the degradation of nature is more important than ever.

Ride not race

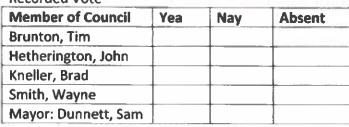

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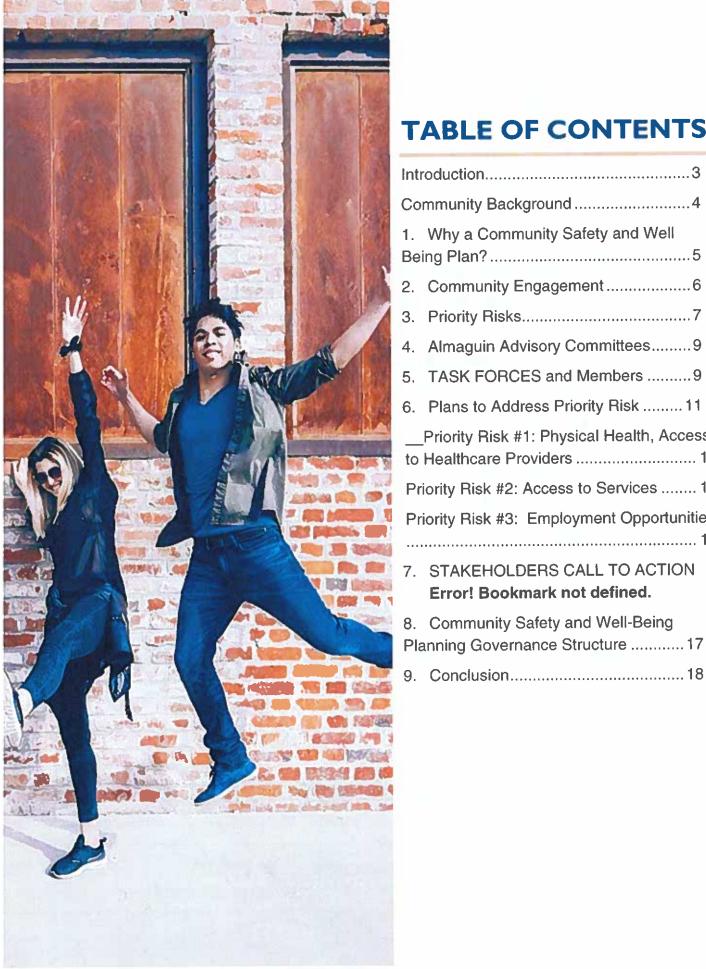


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INTRODUCTION

This Community Safety and Well-Being Plan has been developed on behalf of the communities located within Almaguin Highlands region. It is intended to guide local partners involved in the community safety plan and well-being planning process. It summarizes the work that has been undertaken in the development of this plan.

This plan is a living document and will be updated as communities move forward in their work in continuing its commitment to the safety and well-being of its communities. While this plan is in and of itself valuable, the most important part is for planning partners to stay organized and inform collaborating communities of identified area priorities. The most valuable outcomes from this process is to continue improved coordination of services, collaboration, information sharing and partnerships between local government, agencies and organizations and an improved quality of life for community members.

COMMUNITY BACKGROUND

The community of Almaguin Highlands has a combined population of 15,866, the largest population is the age group between 15 and 64 years old, and the least populated age group is 85+ years old. 61.2% of the population are in the working age group between 15 to 64 years old.

Most residents in Almaguin Highlands are married, with the remainder of the population being single or in common-law relationships; there is also a presence of divorced and widowed households. Most of the land is residential, while other land is seasonal cottages. There is a smaller portion with several retail businesses in downtown cores. Households in Almaguin Highlands have an average annual income of \$54,120.

1. WHY A COMMUNITY SAFETY AND WELL BEING PLAN?

The Province's *Police Services Act* was amended January 1, 2019 to mandate every municipality in Ontario have a "community safety and well being plan". The Plan was created using a collaborative multi-sectoral approach recognizing that it is more than crime that sets the safety and well being in a community. The ultimate goal is to address root causes to circumstances creating the emergency response for residents. This achievement would then focus on enhancing social development and prevention tools and mitigating risks before they become emergencies. It is an ambitious goal that all stakeholders aspire to achieve. The creation of this document and the continuing update and work that will result from it will be a great step in realizing true community safety and well being in Almaguin.

Social Development Chart and Well Being Matrix



The Plan had been in the process prior to legislative changes as Almaguin communities and agencies realized early that change in service delivery and working in a more unified manner would assist all residents.

Impact of COVID 19

COVID 19 is a global pandemic that resulted in the Province of Ontario declaring a state of emergency and throughout this period has placed restrictions on gatherings and public meetings for the safety of all Ontarians.

The pandemic will have a direct long-term affect on Almaguin and services as well. There is increased anxiety, widespread community closures, job losses and social disruptions including on-line learning, limits on gatherings, and a new sense of caution for everyone's health.

The agencies and communities working to create this Plan all adjusted their service delivery to continue providing the necessary resources to Almaguin residents. However, it has also increased workloads and affected abilities for contributions to non-urgent assignments. Each partner does recognize the importance of the document and has done their best to ensure their voice is heard and will continue to be heard as the implementation of recommendations and relationships between agencies grow.

2. COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Early Consultations

To support the identification of local risks, partners involved in the development of the Almaguin Highlands Community Safety and Well Being Plan hosted community engagement sessions within their own municipalities. The Village of Burk's Falls hosted a community action stakeholders team meeting in 2015. The main issues identified by the school board were learning behaviours, violent outbursts, broken homes and parenting conflicts, as well as not enough funding for after school programs or high school programs. In addition, the team meeting identified an increase in drug addiction, a shortage of affordable housing, and poverty and hunger in families.

The Township of Perry hosted two meetings one in 2015 with community involvement and a secondary meeting in 2016 with agency stakeholders. The first session had approximately 40 participants that included representation from a variety of agencies/organizations across a wide range of sectors and members of the public. The open discussion revealed concerns of risk areas as being, email/telephone scams and cybercrime, underemployment in the vulnerable sector, assistance for victims of male abuse and community patrol/neighbourhood watch. The secondary session with stakeholder agencies held in 2016 was not open to the public. It was initiated to better understand how municipalities can assist in the needs of the various agencies and to encourage more communication and collaborate on identified matters within each agency.

There was a lot of discussion surrounding mental health and the effects it has on the number of calls the OPP and Huntsville Hospital handle. Representatives from the OPP also disclosed the need for community mobilization and working together with other agencies to identify issues and develop strategies for long term solutions for those with mental health issues or those who experience victimization.

Service Provider Consultation

While it is the municipalities steering the development of the Plan, our role is to facilitate as we do not provide direct services. However, as you will see further along, there is a role for councils to mitigate risks moving forward.

In 2019 as the Almaguin municipalities began to work together to create the full Community Safety and Well Being Plan. A survey was sent to all agency stakeholders to update the issues and concerns they are experiencing to find common themes and identify emerging issues. A summary of the results is attached in the appendix.

Public Consultation

What the community depicts as concerns is equally as important as the municipalities and the agencies who are addressing the known and on-going issues in the region.

The survey asked questions regarding: safety, security and crime; physical and mental health; experience with substance abuse; opinions on quality of life and employment information. A copy of the survey is available in the Appendix.

The survey was available to every resident in Almaguin. There was an on-line component through Survey Monkey as well as hard copies available for pick up/completion in each municipality. The survey, while anonymous, asked each participant to identify where they live, their gender, age and other demographic information. From this we know the majority of the respondents at 73% were married females aged between 36 and 55 and 86% of the respondents were permanent residents.

Residents provide a different perspective and can highlight where people are struggling or when plans and policies are already working to mitigate issues. The agency results does include areas that the residential survey does not include and vice versa. However, there are some common themes identified as well and that will be the focus of the Plan.

3. PRIORITY RISKS

The risks identified throughout this Plan were selected through the stakeholder and community surveys. Seven agency stakeholders submitted statistics, emerging trends, current programs and problems they viewed as needing assistance with.

The community survey resulted in a total of 444 responses. There were 34 multiple choice questions where some questions allowed for written comments. The surveys were sorted by municipality along with the top safety and well-being items the communities felt were of the most important.

The top three (3) community concerns that closely related to agency stakeholder concerns will be a focus in this first four year plan.

Top 3 Community Safety and Well-Being Priorities

- 1. Physical Health, Access to Healthcare
 - 49.04% respondents rated the most important safety and well-being priority was the lack of healthcare physicians and services within the Almaguin region. There was an outstanding amount of concern with the fact that there are not enough doctors in our areas. Quite a number of individuals do not have a family doctor that is close or do not have a family doctor

at all. Other responses included having no access to walk in clinics or health resources such as nurse practitioners, optometrists, dentists, therapists, labs, etc.).

2. Access to Services

 A majority of responses were related to the lack of access to healthcare services and supports. 123 responses out of 444 represented 32.63%, indicating that program and clinic location has impacted their ability to receive proper physical or mental health supports. Lack of local mental health support or long wait times to get into counselling services were also expressed. There were a minimal number of responses for access to a gym, summer/camp activities for children and indoor recreational programs.

3. Employment Opportunities

The majority of answers regarding employment were either full time workers or retired. Of
those that are currently unemployed, lack of opportunity and location were the most
prominent factors that were preventing people from finding a job. Precarious employment
and insufficient opportunities are also a concern. Opportunities for youth employment were
also reported as lacking.

Further priority risk factors that are common between stakeholders with a stronger rating from agencies are;

4. Affordable Housing

• Comments from both agency and the community surveys in 2019 expressed concerns regarding affordable housing. Whether the housing is rental or ownership, shelter is clearly a necessary item that improves many of the social development and community well being.

5. Services to Youth and Education Institutions

 In discussions, it is clearly evident that youth are affected by the factors of social development from an early age. These factors may affect ability to learn and to focus in class.
 It is important to identify youth who need assistance early to provide them with the best opportunities for success.

There are common social denominators, Province wide, that are widely known to effect one's development and quality of life. These are mental health, substance abuse, and violence. It is interesting to note that while agencies in Almaguin placed these among the higher rated issues that they respond to, the community survey results did not rank them high. Out of 27 issues asked to be ranked in the survey the community ranked personal safety as 9th and mental health and substance abuse as 15th and 22nd with domestic violence as 19th overall.

It is suggestive that as the top 5 priorities become addressed and people are finding security when those factors are resolved, that the response for mental health and protective services will be relatively reduced.

4. ALMAGUIN ADVISORY COMMITTEES

An Almaguin Advisory Committee was formed to delve into the issues and concerns of various stakeholders within our communities. Meetings will continue to be held to address new and continuous concerns and collaborate on ideas to assist each other. The advisory committee membership consisted of:

These two task forces met as needed to identify needs with the community and provide recommendations on how to mitigate the concerns as they were expressed.

A. Physical Health, Access to Healthcare (Priority 1 and 2)

 Purpose: to discuss priority one (1) and two (2) regarding how to attract and retain physicians within Almaguin Highlands and to address healthcare issues with a regional approach.

6. PLANS TO ADDRESS PRIORITY RISK

Priority Risk #1: Physical Health, Access to Healthcare Providers

A large amount of the population within Almaguin Highlands is without access to primary healthcare physicians and healthcare services. As a result, individuals have been on long waiting lists to obtain a family physician in the limited areas where physicians are located. Additionally, the Almaguin Highlands has not attracted several other healthcare services that are provided in larger centers. Residents have to travel long distances for specialist consultations, treatments, nurse practitioners and even walk-in clinics.

Vulnerable Group: infants, children, young families and seniors

Risk Factors: undiagnosed ailments, lack of primary care

Protective Factors: positive medical outcomes, healthcare support services, transportation service increases

Activities:

- Broker partnerships between healthcare professionals within Almaguin Highlands
- Expansion of services for after hours
- Engagement sessions involving agency stakeholders
- Meetings held every three months with healthcare committees, physicians, local health networks
- Review outcomes of physician recruitment process to consider amending and enhancing procedures
- Implement transportation services

Immediate Outcomes:

- Community is better informed of issues faced related to community safety and well-being (healthcare and employment specifically)
- Impacts of not receiving immediate healthcare, all age groups affected, continued communication with service providers, agencies and stakeholders
- Increased access to healthcare and transportation
- A coordinated approach to supporting the efforts of the advisory groups who are helping to bring primary care to our region

Intermediate Outcomes:

Increase access to physicians

Long-Term Outcomes:

Increase community safety and well-being through an increase in healthcare services

Priority Risk #2: Access to Services

The lack of transportation continues to affect all age groups within Almaguin Highlands. Seniors do not have the ability to leave their houses to do simple everyday tasks. Youth, young and middle age citizens are at risk of not gaining employment. There is no access to healthcare services for those that may need to travel to different centers (for OTN or to obtain specialist appointments).

Vulnerable Group: infants, children, young families and seniors

Risk Factors: poor mental health, loneliness, low self-esteem, impulsivity

Protective Factors: self-esteem, adaptability, access to/availability of resources, professional services and social supports

Activities:

- Broker partnerships between municipal and ride-hailing companies (Uber, Lyft)
- Engage local businesses to commence a ride-share committee. Possible to have volunteers pick up new or existing employees/residents requiring transportation
- Participating municipalities promote Carpool Almaguin parking lots consider digital options for promotion and ride sharing linking, etc.
- Communicate with busing companies inquiring about the use of school buses outside of start and end times for school
- Continued support in economic development
- Create a website for ride-share options

Immediate Outcomes:

- Job employability increases
- Individuals are able to get the healthcare services they require
- Seniors will be provided opportunities to be independent and socialize

Intermediate Outcomes:

The level of service availability meets the needs of the population

Long-Term Outcomes:

 Increase community safety and well-being through an increase in healthcare and employment services. Will also greatly increase social interaction and provide an avenue for independence

Priority Risk #3: Employment Opportunities

There is a disconnect between employers and people seeking employment in and around Almaguin Highland region. The current COVID-19 pandemic is inhibiting job seekers as the government supplies CERB and Employment Insurance which strengthens the lack of motivation. There is a declining population with not enough people to fill job vacancies and larger centers have larger projects thereby bringing in more people. The lack of transportation is also a defining factor for people not being able to commute between home and job sites.

Vulnerable Group: teens, young to middle income families

Risk Factors: lack of opportunities for young people possibly leading them to addictions or crime, not knowing whether bills can be paid can lead to emotional instability/stress/anxiety

Protective Factors: self-esteem, positive relationship with family and friends, stability of the family unit, opportunities for youth and young families

Activities:

- Engage multiple business meetings seeking what employers are looking for and assisting them with job applicant opportunities
- Implementation of settlement and retention strategy integrate immigration into placements and assist in finding housing
- Implement strategies for advertising and promoting outside the Almaguin Highlands region
- Engage high school students asking them what they are seeking and how employment services can assist

Immediate Outcomes:

- Increase in self-awareness and pride
- Ability to self-sustain
- Connecting individuals with skills to appropriate jobs

Intermediate Outcomes:

 Job seekers are provided with the support they require to obtain gainful employment with the assistance of employment programs

Long-Term Outcomes:

Increase community safety and well-being with job stability and housing

7. STAKEHOLDERS CALL TO ACTION

There are several actions that all stakeholders can do to improve the safety and well being of Almaguin communities. Only by working together can the activities and goals outlined be realized.

1. Advocate

Having an understanding of what the community and the service agencies consider to be the issues in Almaguin better prepares each stakeholder to advocate for change. Chronic underfunding and staffing issues are identified as issues actively affecting Almaguin.

Municipal councils can advocate and support increased funding when meeting with senior levels of government for health care services. There are several existing groups in the region who are working toward increasing access to services such as the East Parry Sound Community Service (Eastholme), Almaguin Highlands Health Council, and doctors and Family Health Teams. When councils are deciding policies, they can consider the priorities listed to ensure they are being proactive in the resolution. For instance, when reviewing official plans they can create policies regarding affordable housing, secondary units, where growth will be focused to mitigate transportation barriers and when developers approach to build subdivisions or multi-residential units agreements can be created to ensure some affordable units are made available. Creating and supporting volunteer programs/organizations and opportunities can provide residents with new skills that can be transferred to employment positions. Supporting businesses and new start-up companies and ensuring they have access to regional resources improves the overall economy.

2. Communication and Awareness

Open and two-way communication is necessary to informing advocacy as well as ensuring efforts are collaborative and not duplicating efforts. While it may be inevitable, like minded groups working toward the same goals can share notes/minutes with councils and other agencies to augment efforts instead of straining limited resources. This could be the creation of quarterly or semi-annual meetings between similar organizations (health committees, education services) to discuss new trends and emerging issues. Some such communities exist, such as HOME, the AHHC, and the OPP/Mental Health Protocols. Only by championing additional collaboration can better mitigation and prevention be obtained.

Equally important is the ability for residents to have open dialogue with all stakeholders. Transparency, accountability and creating the awareness for residents to become involved and have a voice will garner trust and with intention allow people to seek assistance.

Just as the local well being services and agencies will develop more collaboration opportunities, it is important to ensure all municipal officials and stakeholders know there are resources available to them now. While Almaguin may be underserviced, it is not void of services. In the Appendix is a list of services within the region. It is important to know who to call. When it is urgent with an active crisis call 911. If the situation allows, call 211 for the right service contacts. The awareness of what assistance is available is a critical step to improving everyone's safety and well being.

3. Data Collection

It was evident in the preparation of this Plan that Almaguin specific data is not well kept by all agencies. Many local services are based regionally and have statistics for the head-office but not at the local levels that are easily obtainable. It is time consuming to track responses that become consumed in larger reporting requirements. It is important that any local office also keep statistics and bench marking tools for the Almaguin area. In trying to determine what affordable housing looks like, agencies do not keep a list of area rental rates to gauge market values in Almaguin. Canadian Mortgage and Housing Corporation does not have a figure for affordable rent between Parry Sound, Nipissing and Muskoka. Almaguin is combined, yet a very different community than the rest. This, then means, any developer has to complete their own study which may be a deterrent to providing affordable housing. When sitting on agencies, boards and communities, council members can advocate for better data collection opportunities.

4. Cooperation

The safety of Almaguin can be gauged by the calls for service by the Almaguin OPP Detachment. It will be necessary to implement key strategies to mitigate victimization. Speeding, impaired and distracted driving on roadways and ATV/Snowmobile trails is a concern and education programs are in place to prevent these occurrences. Municipalities can assist by sharing information on social media platforms, really from all agencies that service Almaguin.

The Almaguin OPP works with the Muskoka Health Centre to streamline intake protocols, the Canadian Mental Health Association through co-response and intervention teams and they participate in a program with the District of Parry Sound Social Services for homelessness. The Almaguin Detachment Commander is required to draft a three (3) year action plan and posts an annual update on OPP.ca. The local statistics on calls-for-service identify the priorities and action steps to mitigate the most urgent of matters in Almaguin.

Community Policing Boards are being creating by the Province and the Almaguin Detachment will have a Board as already determined by the municipalities to the Solicitor General. The next step for this initiative is expected early 2022. It will take this cooperation

among the OPP, municipalities, and the social agencies to bring meaningful change to Almaguin residents.

9. CONCLUSION

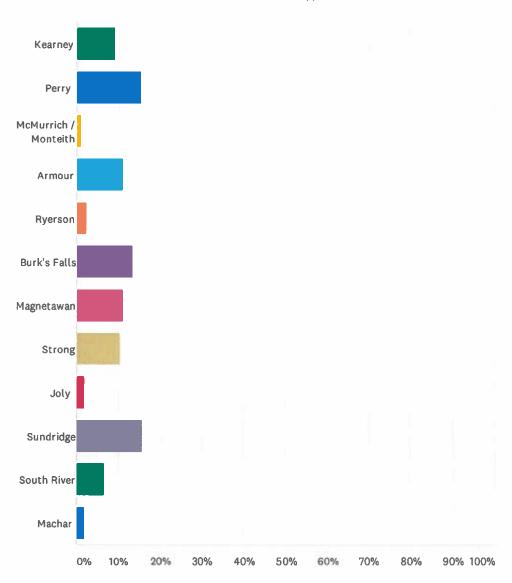

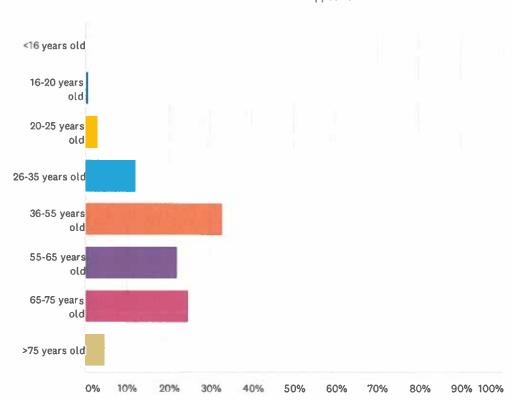

Q2 What is your age?



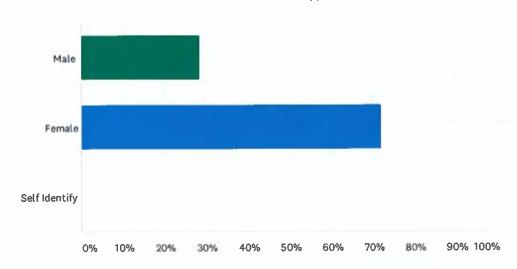

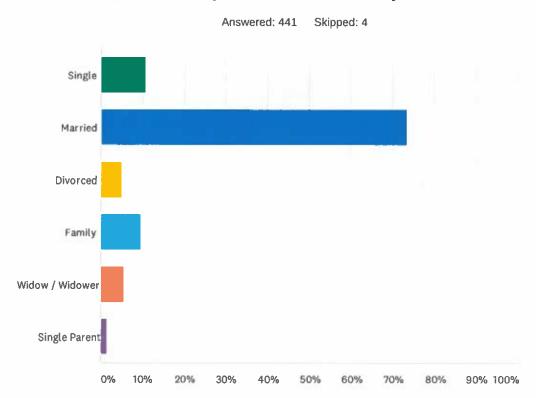
Q3 What is your gender?

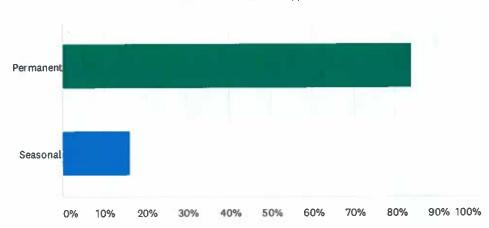
Q4 What is your marital & family status?

Q5 Are you a seasonal or permanent resident?

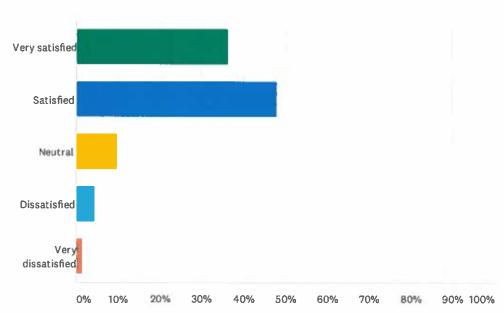

Q6 How do you feel about your personal safety?

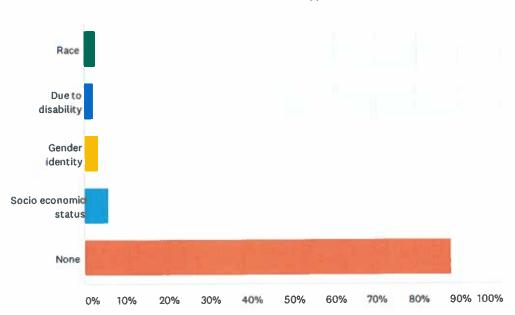

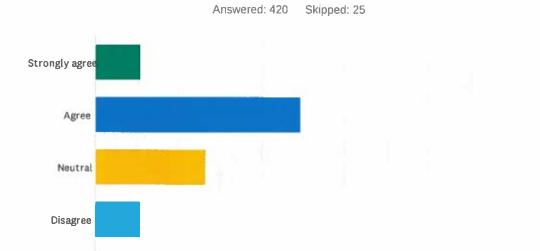
Q7 Have you ever felt unsafe due to:

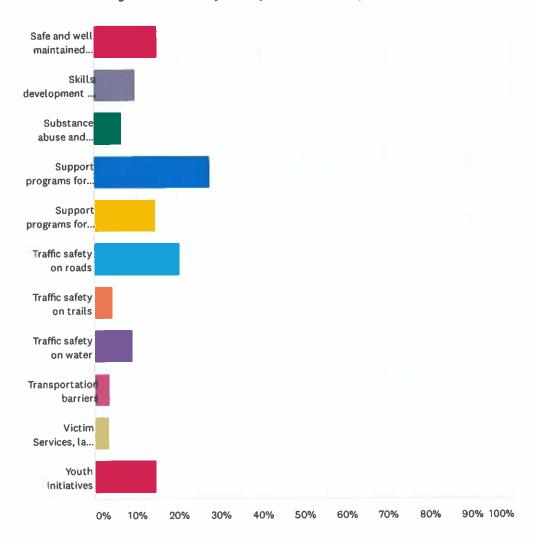

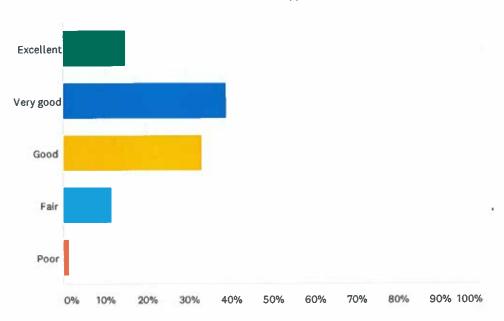

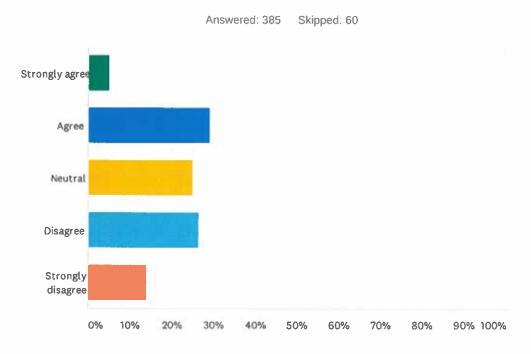
Q11 Overall my physical health is

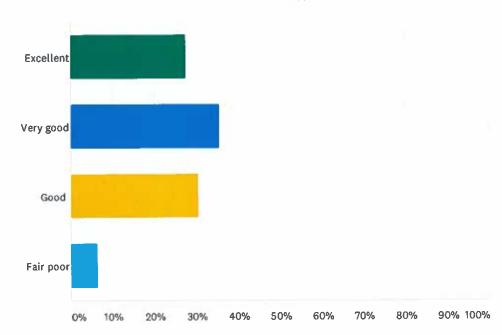

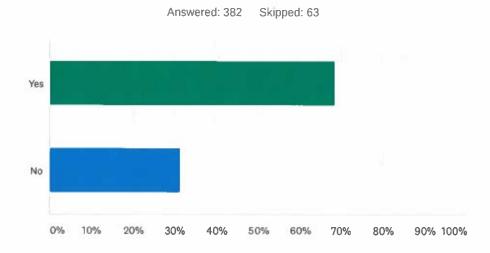

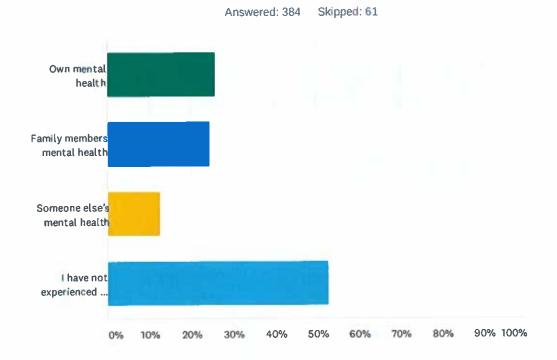

Q15 Do you have access to healthcare benefits for physical or mental health supports?



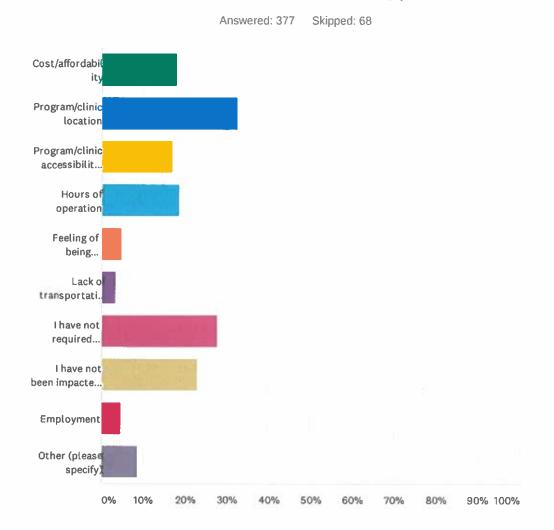

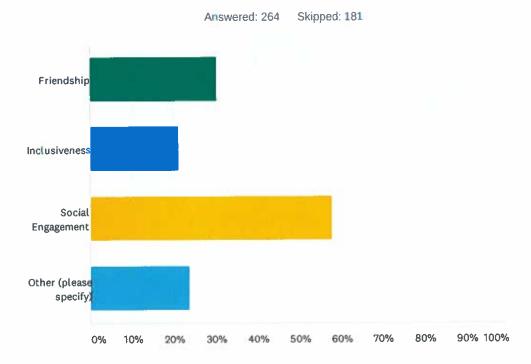
Q22 How do you prefer to socialize?

Q29 If you currently are, or ever been unemployed in your community, what factors prevented you from finding a job?

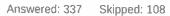


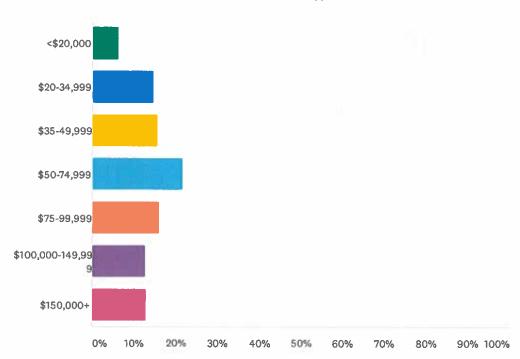

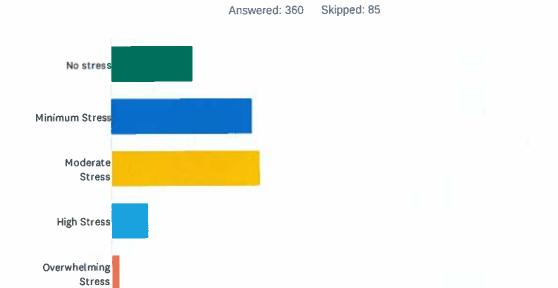
Q30 Total income annually for your household

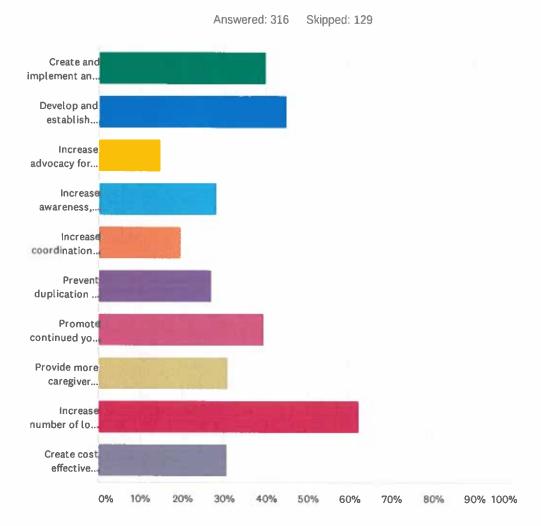

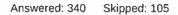

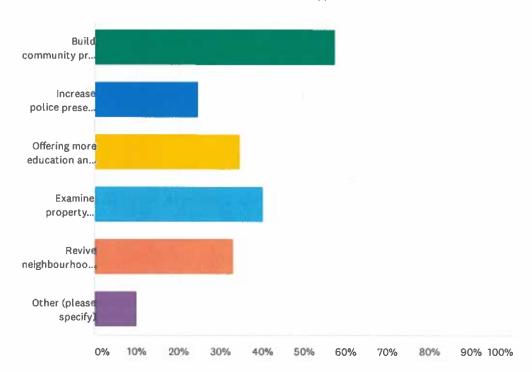

Call to Order

The meeting was called to order at 6:05 pm.

Minutes

The minutes of the meeting of Monday, December 13, 2021 meeting were adopted as amended.

Director of Economic Development (DED) Report

The Director of Economic Development discussed changing the reporting period for the monthly reports to based on a calendar month. The Board did not have any objections to the change.

2022 Workplan

The Director of Economic Development advised the Board that he would be sending out the 2022 workplan by the end of the week. He is asking all Board members to review the plan and advise of any concerns or proposed changes so these can be discussed at the February meeting.

One concern raised was the increase in the cost of housing in our region and the impacts of housing market activity on communities. It was expressed that councils and ACED should seek to analyze and understand these impacts and identify ways to address opportunities and possible threats (EG. impacts to emergency services).

Regional Brand Strategy Implementation

The Director of Economic Development and the Regional Brand Coordinator presented a staff report and an evaluation chart on the results of the Request for Proposals (RFP) ACED solicited to provide web development services to create a regional website. The Board discussed the results and passed a resolution recommending that the proposal from 9 Lives Design be accepted.

2021 Annual Report

The ACED Board reviewed and discussed the 2021 Annual Report presented by the Director of Economic Development.

The report summarized all the activities of the Economic Development Department for 2021. Highlights included:

- 1. Activities intended to support businesses in any capacity, including, but not limited to, business start ups, business expansions, general business support, online presence building, networking, and business site selection.
- 2. Activities that support community and recreation-based organizations and supporting community and recreation-based projects undertaken by municipalities where efforts benefit multiple partners.
- Activities that are intended to increase the region's ability to attract investment of any kind. Typically, capacity building initiatives provide less immediately tangible results, however, in many cases they provide a foundation for future activities or growth.
- 4. Activities intended to market or promote any aspect of the region.
- 5. Activities geared to draw enhanced attention to regional features and assets.

The report highlighted the fact that some of the items in the 2021 workplan could not be completed because COVID-19 required that some of the priorities for projects change. The 2022 workplan should include some of these items. Board members commented that the report was very informative.

Post 2023 ACED Department Outlook and Funding

The Board inquired when the different funding options for ACED would be presented. The Director of Economic Development advised that these should be ready for the next ACED meeting.

Updates

FedNor

Ron Begin commented that the ACED 2021 Annual Report was very well done and contained a lot of information relevant to the work that was done. He wondered how much more ACED could do to help businesses. He gave credit to ACED for the fact that if they were not there, the region could have lost a lot more than it did because of COVID-19.

He advised that intake of applications has slowed down. Tourism programs are still available. There is still a challenge dealing with COVID-19 and he appreciated the discussion that the Board had on helping the region.

MENDM

Melanie Alkins commented that the 2021 Annual Report was well done. If anyone has outstanding applications, please send them in as soon as possible. Funding for internships is available and these can help with staff shortages. The reconnect program has received new funding and applications can be presented for evaluation. There is a \$10,000 grant available at this time for businesses to help cope with the COVID-19 shutdown.

2021 ANNUAL REPORT

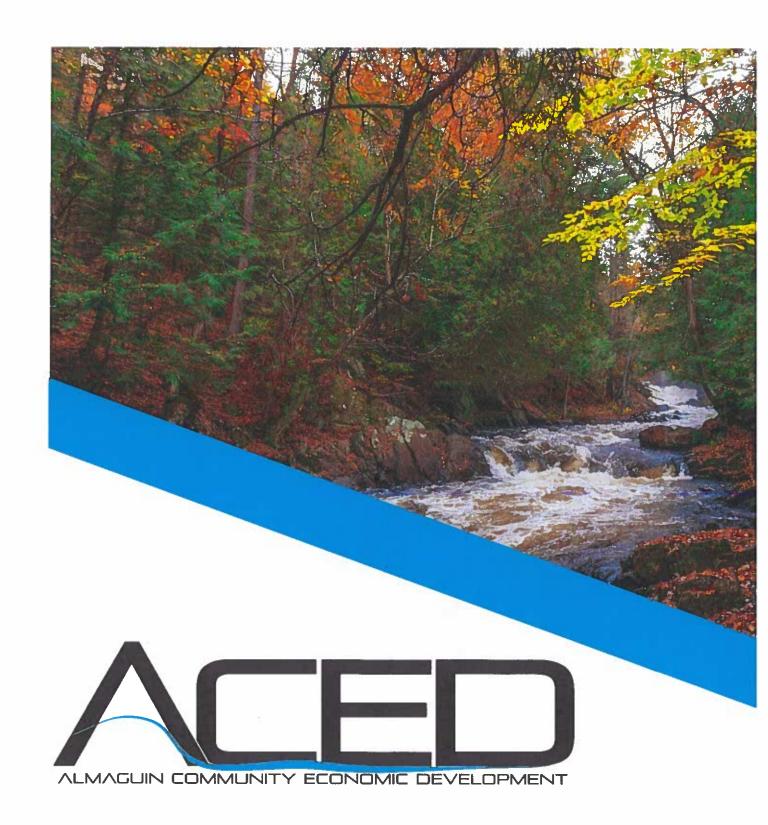


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<u>Introduction</u>

The Almaguin Community Economic Development (ACED) Team is pleased to present the 2021 Annual Report which includes a summary of initiatives, activities, and results from the year. Initially, the focus for the team was to support a return to normalcy for businesses, organizations, and other stakeholders as the effects of the pandemic subsided. The goal at the outset was to continue developing and implementing initiatives based on recommendations from guiding strategies while building capacity for internal and external growth. While this goal was achieved in several capacities, the need to find innovative ways to support businesses, tourism, and cultural assets became evident, which prompted some deviation from the initial 2021 Work Plan.

This partial change of direction, combined with several other external trends and factors, brought about some very interesting benefits to the regional economy. New residents and visitors were met with many ways to discover and experience Almaguin; businesses, artists and organizations were connected both with support opportunities and different ways to connect with people; and regional supportive partners came together to find creative ways to help meet the needs of the region. While the year may have had its twists and turns, the mandate of ACED was upheld, and positive momentum was maintained.

"ACED will develop our economy and regional environment through taking strategic action and stewarding strong relationships between municipalities, the business community, community organizations and economic development stakeholders."

2021 ACED Activities Overview

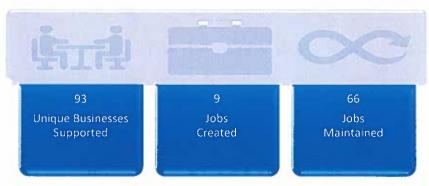
- Business Support and Development: Activities intended to support businesses in any capacity.

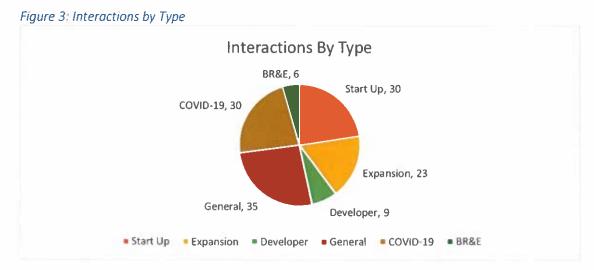


Figure 4: Unique Businesses By Location

C. Digital Main Street and Online Presence Support

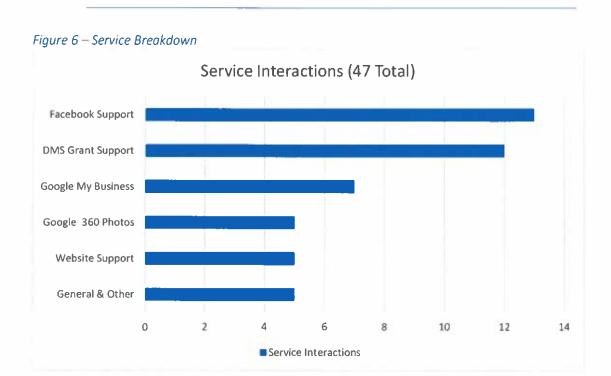


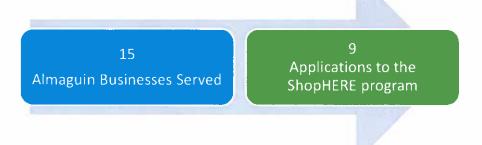
Figure 7 – Unique Businesses by Municipality

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E. AHCC Partnerships

Throughout 2021, the Almaguin Highlands Chamber of Commerce (AHCC) and ACED Staff partnered on several major initiatives.

Welcome Wagon Program

Staff supported the development of the AHCC Welcome Wagon Program. The program will provide a variety of useful information about supports available throughout the region as well as an initial introduction for the AHCC. The AHCC has committed to developing an initial 25 packages as a pilot; once completed, the effectiveness of the program will be assessed.

International Women's Day

The Influential Women of Almaguin Campaign was developed in partnership with the AHCC to celebrate impactful women throughout the region. Each of the nominees were showcased on the ACED Facebook Page and on a dedicated page on the investalmaguin.ca website.



F. Win This Space Almaguin

ACED Staff are supporting the Village of Burk's Falls in the development and deployment of their Win This Space initiative. The Business Centre Nipissing Parry Sound, The Women's Own Resource Centre and NECO CFDC have also been engaged to support the program, which will roll out in Q1 of 2022. The target for program completion and business occupancy is the Victoria Day weekend in May. ACED Staff will be participating in the program by offering support for partnership development, marketing, and implementation support as required.

The program will feature the following key components:

- 1. Entrepreneurial Supports: Business plan writing workshop, regional support network development, and other benefits supported by regional support organizations.
- Public Private Partnerships: Two privately owned locations are being considered for inclusion based on participant uptake. Lease amounts through the first year will be partially or completely subsidized based on the final terms of the program and the agreed contributions from private and public sector partners.
- 3. Program in a Box: all program components and results will be packaged to allow for communities throughout the region to implement the program in the future.

KPI RESULTS: 3 Locations Established (by Burk's Falls) VS. 2 Projected; 0 participants in 2021 VS. 5 projected.

2.0 Community Development

A. Community Program G.R.O



ACED Staff have developed the G.R.O. Program which includes course materials and the G.R.O. workbook. Staff began marketing the program via email and social media in Q3 of 2021. These methods did not generate interest from support organizations, which prompted a direct phone approach. Agricultural societies have been contacted as a preliminary focal group with other groups to follow.

KPI RESULTS: 1 Organization Supported (2 Pending) VS. 5 Projected; 0 Volunteer Positions marketed VS. 15 Projected

B. Village Impressions Program

The Village Impressions Program was not pursued in 2021 as reported on the September 27th Directors report. Interest in the program will be reassessed in the Spring of 2022.

C. Regional Recreation Support

Promote and support the development of the Driftscape Platform

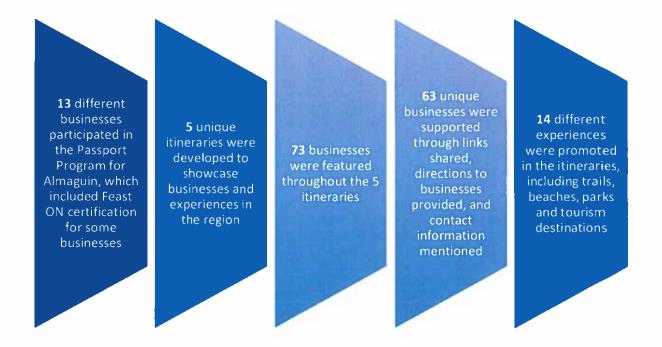
ACED Staff supported the exploration of the Driftscape Platform early in 2021. Burk's Falls and Perry Township have pursued the platform and are actively listing points of interest throughout their communities. ACED Staff had limited involvement with the set-up process; however, they provided a description for the Villages of Almaguin 'parent' layer on the Driftscape app. Currently there are 16 points of interest for the region that are being promoted through the service.

Support the Development of Experience Itineraries

ACED Staff participated in the Great Taste of Ontario Road Trip led by the Ontario Culinary Tourism Alliance. Staff produced several tourism itineraries and an Almaguin Passport that were promoted through the program. Many Almaguin businesses and experiences were supported and promoted through this initiative as noted below.

Almaguin Highlands Tourism Website Partnerships

The development of the Almaguin Regional website through the Brand Strategy implementation will involve the decommissioning of the current Almaguin Highlands Tourism site. The content and information from the site will be kept and included in the tourism component of the new site. Municipal and community organization partnerships will be sought when the new site is under construction, which will allow for a one-time training process.

Staycation in Almaguin

The Staycation in Almaguin initiative, which is reported in further detail below and in the Staycation in Almaguin Final Report, involved significant regional partnerships and produced many positive benefits to recreation and culture throughout the region.

KPI RESULTS: 14 experiences promoted VS. 25 Projected (Great Taste of Ontario); 2 partnerships created VS. 2 Projected

3.0 Economic Capacity Building

A. Operation Open 4 Business

Through Operation Open 4 Business, ACED Staff met with staff members of five municipalities to review several items such as ACED's core services to businesses, support that can be provided to businesses and investment clients and current plans/priorities that municipalities have in place. Other points included an overview of the communication process between ACED and businesses/investors and how ACED can offer support for municipally specific projects that are consistent with community or economic development.

KPI RESULTS – 5 Municipalities Engaged VS. 5 Projected

B. Broadband Development

For 2021, ACED Staff focused on maintaining an awareness of the status of broadband funding applications, sharing municipally specific data made available through Blue Sky Net's BAEMAP system and support any active expansion projects that they were invited to.

- ✓ Staff participated in the planning phase of the Lakeland Networks expansion in South Almaguin. This project was funded by the Universal Broadband Fund and promises to bring high-speed internet to 1.300 unserved households.
- ✓ Staff assisted in planning the extension of fiber optic services to the Armour Township Industrial Parks (planned for completion in 2022). This extension is complementary to the project noted above and adds approximately five residential households and two development properties.
- ✓ Staff reviewed municipal coverage profiles with five municipalities and circulated information regarding changes to the provincial broadband funding structure and their impact to existing funding applications.

KPI RESULTS – 2 Projects Supported; 7 Advocacy Effort Vs. 14 Projected

C. Transportation Development

Throughout the year, ACED participated in several activities to support the research and development of transportation solutions in the region.

- 2021 Parry Sound District Transportation Survey Supported the planning, development, marketing, and distribution of the survey in partnership with The Labour Market Group and the YMCA of Simcoe Muskoka.
 - a. The results from the survey have been posted on the ACED website and forwarded to several transportation providers.
- 2. Private Sector Transportation Service Exploration Staff supported the exploration process of two transportation service providers who had expressed an interest in serving Almaguin. Both

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- providers concluded that significant subsidization would be required to maintain service levels and service reliability.
- 3. Ontario Northlander Rail Service Advocacy Staff advocated on behalf of ACED for Almaguin's consideration for a stop along the newly announced return of Northlander Rail Service. Staff are positioned to support efforts or projects pursuant to Almaguin's inclusion along the service line.

KPI RESULTS - 2 Projects supported VS. 1 Projected

D. Business Opportunity Profiling
This project was not undertaken in 2021.

E. AHSS Student Engagement

ACED Staff worked with AHSS Faculty to pilot a longitudinal study aimed at understanding the goals of graduating students. The objectives of 2021 were to:

- Promote and support the Summer Company Program. Attempts were made to coordinate a
 presentation from The Business Centre, but due to class scheduling changes to accommodate
 Public Health recommendations during the COVID pandemic, the school was unable to
 accommodate the presentation.
- 2. Design a graduating class exit interview process to identify opportunities to reattract youth. A survey was created through Survey Monkey and was shared through ACED social media and AHSS social media. The response uptake on the survey was not statistically significant, so further online data collection occurred by accessing information presented from graduate questionnaires via the AHSS Virtual Grad 2021- YouTube. ACED Staff produced the AHSS Student Engagement Report which can be used to compare data collected in future years.

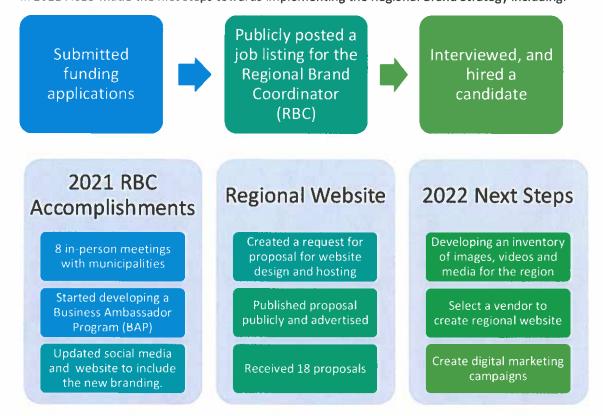

In 2021 ACED made the first steps towards implementing the Regional Brand Strategy including:



B. AG Strategy Implementation

Several recommendations from the 2020 Agriculture and Culinary Stakeholder Engagement Strategy were pursued throughout 2021. ACED Staff sought the support of a group of seven agricultural stakeholders throughout the region to provide feedback and direction regarding several initiatives.

- ✓ The working group launched a trial of the Facebook Workplaces platform. The group currently has the original 7 members and will look to add new members in 2022.
- ✓ The Eat Local Spring Newsletter was created using content and articles from local business operators.
- ✓ The Tastes of Almaguin Food Truck Bingo campaign through Staycation in Almaguin promoted 30 restaurants across the region while encouraging food tourism.
- ✓ The Shop in Almaguin Facebook Page was used to promote, share, and celebrate food within its 629 posts, shares, and advertising, while growing its audience by 13%.
- √ 12 agriculture and culinary experiences were developed and/or promoted through Staycation in Almaguin which were enjoyed by over 1000 participants.
- ✓ Staff promoted access to farming & culinary opportunities as well as support and learning opportunities.

C. Tourism Promotion

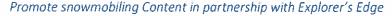
The ACED Team invested significant efforts in promoting tourism throughout the region which focused on celebrating multiple sectors such as arts, recreation, culture, culinary and other sectors.

Redevelopment of the Almaguin Highlands Tourism Website

Through the Almaguin Brand Strategy Implementation process, the Almaguin Highlands Tourism website will be redeveloped into single regional website as a part of the Brand Hub for the region. Further advancement will occur throughout 2022.

Finalize the Great Taste of Ontario Road Trip Itineraries

This initiative was successfully completed and reported on in section 2C (Figure 11).





The content partnership with Explorer's Edge was executed in Q4 of 2021 which involved the social media promotion of peak-season snowmobiling via the article produced in the late winter of 2020. Below is a snapshot of midpromotion results taken during the drafting of this report.

Promoted recreational trail usage, events, and activities in partnership with Discovery Routes

Through Staycation in Almaguin, 8 experiences were developed and promoted that encouraged access to local trail systems including the Almaguin Harvest Spin, the Bear Chair Trail Race, and the Pathways to the Forgotten Trails experience.

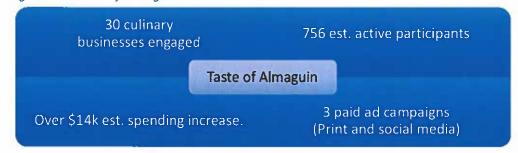

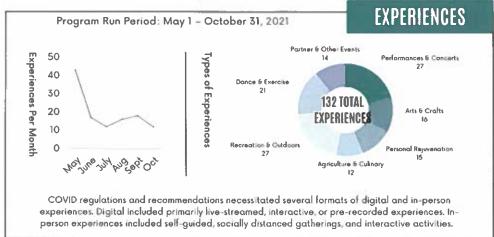

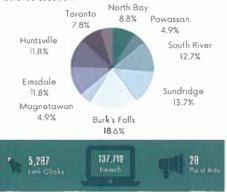

2022 ACED DEPARTMENT WORK PLAN



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INTRODUCTION

The 2022 ACED Workplan has been designed as a framework that will guide the efforts of staff through 2022. As with previous years, staff will continue to work towards implementing the strategic directions set out in the various plans and studies that have been produced through collective, regional efforts. In addition to planned and recommended action items, ACED efforts will also be heavily focused on supporting the implementation of the Regional Brand Strategy as well as supporting businesses and community service organizations as they continue to experience challenges resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, with a focus on supporting their recovery.

THE PLAN

All work plan action items have been categorized into five primary themes that represent the objectives and core functions of the ACED Board and Department. Each of these themes is intended to reinforce a specific outcome as defined under their respective headings. Specific action items for each theme have been derived from evidence-based research as referenced in the following guiding documents:

The 2018 RED Plan The 2020 Ag Strategy
The 2021 Brand Strategy The 2016 BR&E Report

An index of performance targets can be seen in Appendix B.



1.0 BUSINESS SUPPORT AND DEVELOPMENT

Business support and development encompasses all activities intended to support businesses in any capacity. This includes but is not limited to start up, expansion, general business support, online presence building, networking, and site selection.

A. BUSINESS SUPPORT COST: TIME/TRAVEL TIMELINE: CORE/ONGOING

Directly supporting businesses and entrepreneurs as they pursue their goals and navigate challenges has been a core function of ACED and previous economic development initiatives for many years. In 2022, ACED Staff will work to increase the promotion of these services as well as remain available for inbound support requests and referrals from stakeholder organizations. Additional core supports include:

- i. Business directory updates (Annual).
- ii. Accommodation directory updates (Annual).
- iii. Asset inventory updates (Quarterly).
- iv. Digital Main Street Partnership (The Business Centre, as available).

B. BR&E PROCESS COST: TIME/TRAVEL TIMELINE: CORE

The DoED and EDO will design and launch an ongoing Business Retention and Expansion process that will include a standard BR&E survey which will be used to identify opportunities and challenges and provide direct supports to businesses throughout the year. The BR&E process will be promoted through outreach in partnership with ED stakeholders and through direct communications and social media networks.

C. BUSINESS SUPPORT EVENTS COST: \$2,000 TIMELINE: BI-MONTHLY

Through partnerships with local ED stakeholders and organizations, ACED will co-host a series of business support and networking events, consistent with a social atmosphere. As COVID restrictions permit, events will be in-person to facilitate networking opportunities. Should inperson events not be possible, virtual information sessions will showcase support opportunities with partnering organizations serving Almaguin in a mini-presentation and 'Ask-Me-Anything' format to encourage open dialogue.



D. AHCC PARTNERSHIPS COST: \$2,000 TIMELINE: PROJECT SPECIFIC

Staff will continue to work with the AHCC Board to implement their core programming and continue to build capacity throughout the region. Specific action items include:

- Support the implementation of an AHCC Welcome Wagon program to support awareness of, and membership within, the Chamber of Commerce while promoting ACED services.
- ii. Partner to implement the second annual Influential Women of Almaguin initiative.
- iii. Support the enhancement of the Almaguin Highlands Chamber of Commerce Community Guide and Directory per the Brand Strategy Asset Development recommendations.

E. WIN THIS SPACE ALMAGUIN COST: \$1,000 TIMELINE: Q1 & Q2

ACED Staff will support the Village of Burk's Falls' win this space competition through providing direct program support to Village staff and business participants. This will include workshop support, promotional support, and other services as required. ACED will work with program partners to collect and package information, resources, and best practices that can be used by other communities in the region who wish to pursue similar initiatives in the future.

2.0 COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Community development is broken into two main segments: working to support community and recreation-based organizations; and supporting community and recreation-based projects undertaken by municipalities and other partners.

A. COMMUNITY PROGRAM G.R.O. COST: \$2,000 TIMELINE: Q1-Q2

ACED staff will continue to seek out and support community organizations who have experienced challenges because of the pandemic. ACED will offer direct, individualized support to organizations which will focus on assessing their needs and providing tools to support their efforts. Support offerings will include:

- i. Attending meetings and facilitate the completion of the G.R.O. workbook.
- ii. Providing access to the Almaguin Website Volunteer Portal.
- iii. Identifying opportunities for funding support and other collaborative efforts such as volunteer fairs.



B. VILLAGE IMPRESSIONS PROGRAM COST: TIME/TRAVEL TIMELINE: Q2/Q3

Through consultations with municipal stakeholders, ACED staff will finalize the community visitation and recommendations process which will focus on beautifying community centres throughout Almaguin. Where possible, ACED will lead any collaborative funding applications that align beautification efforts throughout the region with a focus on regional brand adoption.

C. REGIONAL RECREATION SUPPORT COST: TIME TIMELINE: 2022

Through the implementation of the Regional Brand Strategy, ACED will catalogue and promote regional recreation opportunities through the Almaguin Website, regional guide, and mapping recommendations. ACED will seek partnership opportunities with supportive organizations such as Discovery Routes and Explorer's Edge to promote awareness of regional recreation assets. Additionally, and wherever possible, ACED Staff will support municipal projects that are consistent with the recommendations made in the 2018 RED Plan such as "maintain and expand recreational, sports and cultural opportunities". Specific projects include:

- i. Work with municipal staff to catalogue and promote recreational assets through the Almaguin Website.
- ii. Support the development of experience itineraries and content and help coordinate marketing efforts to reach seasonal audiences.
- iii. Build and share a regional recreation photography and videography database.
- iv. Support the efforts of municipalities to create and improve recreation spaces.

3.0 ECONOMIC CAPACITY BUILDING

Economic capacity building represents activities that are intended to increase the region's ability to attract investment of any kind. Typically, capacity building initiatives provide less immediately tangible results; however, in many cases they provide a foundation for future activities, increase the investment readiness of the region, or otherwise position the region for growth.

A. MUNICIPAL ENGAGEMENT COST: TIME/TRAVEL TIMELINE: Q1 & Q2

Continuing with the municipal meetings from 2021, ACED staff will engage municipal staff to identify opportunities to support municipal projects and the pursuit of development related capacity building. Key areas of interest could include:



- i. Identifying economic development, recreation, and marketing related priorities.
- ii. Supporting the development of industrial and commercial properties.
- iii. Supporting staff in adopting the regional brand and encouraging marketing partnership opportunities per the Brand Strategy.

B. BROADBAND DEVELOPMENT

COST: TIME

TIMELINE: CORE

ACED staff will continue to monitor the priorities of the Ministry of Infrastructure's efforts to deploy broadband services to all homes and businesses by 2025. Additionally, staff will remain positioned to support any initiatives aimed at increasing broadband service availability, whether through pursuing funding or assisting with planning efforts undertaken by public or private sector stakeholders.

C. TRANSPORTATION

COST: \$,2500

TIMELINE: Q2

ACED will build on the 2021 efforts related to the Carpool Almaguin lots by investigating opportunities to revitalize or replace existing signage at established or new locations. ACED will additionally remain positioned to support the continued consideration and exploration of Almaguin as a stop for the Northlander Train Service.

Staff will use existing ACED channels to promote the use of publicly maintained lots for
ride sharing opportunities and safe exchange sites for private marketplace transactions
(Kijiji, etc.). Staff will also continue to investigate other creative solutions to overcome
transportation barriers where possible through researching best practices and supporting
private sector initiatives where they exist.

E. AHSS STUDENT ENGAGEMENT

COST: TIME

TIMELINE: Q2

Building on the relationship established with the AHSS Staff and Faculty, staff will maintain their presence to support entrepreneurialism, civic engagement and participation in the longitudinal study introduced in 2021. ACED will work with community support organizations to promote and deliver programs available to students and support students in accessing programs. Specific objectives include:

 Promoting and supporting engagement in the Business Centre's Summer Company program.



- ii. Continuing graduating class exit interview process to identify opportunities to retain or reattract youth.
- iii. Pursue opportunities to an established in-school presence by providing presentations regarding entrepreneurialism, volunteerism, and/or topics highlighted by any class curricula.

4.0 MARKETING AND PROMOTION

Marketing and promotion will encompass all activities intended to market or promote any aspect of the region. This includes website development, general tourism promotion, business joint marketing initiatives (including shop-local activities), local initiative promotion, story telling and other marketing activities. Throughout the priority areas in projects A, B, and C, staff will work to incorporate associated costs into the funding allocated to the regional brand strategy budget under the cost categories that they align with. These cost categories are identified under each specific project.

A. BRAND STRATEGY IMPLEMENTATION COST: \$169,428 TIMELINE: 2022

BRAND STRATEGY COST CATEGORY: ALL

The Regional Brand Coordinator has provided a condensed Brand Strategy workplan which can be seen in Appendix A. All Brand Strategy initiatives will be supported by all ACED staff where required and funded in part by FedNor and the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs.

B. AG STRATEGY IMPLEMENTATION COST: \$1,703+ TIMELINE: Q1-Q3

BRAND STRATEGY COST CATEGORY: Marketing Partnership & Regional Asset Development

Based on consultations with agricultural operators throughout the region, ACED will support and/or develop the following initiatives:

- i. Host 3-4 agri-food networking and information sessions geared to introducing the Workplaces platform and identifying ways to enhance and promote local food.
- ii. Creating a Roadmap to Almaguin Food print and digital.
- iii. Investigating the creation and distribution of farm gate signage using the marketing partnership.
- iv. Creating a dedicated agri-food/food tourism page on the Almaguin website.



- v. Producing agri-food photography and/or videography for the regional database.
- vi. Working with value chain members to populate seasonal agri-food newsletters.
- vii. Work with stakeholders to explore additional marketing and promotional efforts.

C. TOURISM PROMOTION

COST: TBD BY PROJECT TIMELINE: 2022

BRAND STRATEGY COST CATEGORY: Brand Awareness & Regional Asset Development

Using the Almaguin Website and social media channels, ACED will work with tourism stakeholders throughout the region to develop content and stories related to tourism assets. Priority sectors will include arts and culture, four season recreation (paddling, hiking, cycling snowmobiling, ATVing, golf, entertainment, etc.). Staff will engage the support of organizations such as Discovery Routes, Explorers' Edge and Northern Ontario Tourism to promote content, stories and other marketing collateral to draw tourism to the area. Through all efforts, staff will work to promote multiple businesses, natural features, local accommodations and easy-to-access experiences for visitors and residents.

- i. Partner with local businesses to create experience itineraries that promote travel and spending throughout the region.
- ii. Engage multiple organizations such as ATV clubs, Snowmobile Clubs, the Almaguin Highlands Arts Council, and others to ensure accuracy and volume of offerings.
- iii. Produce photography and videography of experiences and tourism products.
- iv. Utilize marketing dollars to push content to southern markets like past Explorer's Edge partnerships.

D. SHOP IN ALMAGUIN CAMPAIGNS COST: \$1000 TIMELINE: SPRING/FALL

Staff will continue to promote shopping and dining locally through creating shop local initiatives and awareness campaigns by partnering with and promoting multiple local businesses.



5.0 SPECIAL EVENTS & PROJECTS

Special Events and Projects are geared to draw enhanced attention to regional features and assets. 2022 will be geared both for event hosting as well as promoting safe and accessible events occurring throughout the region.

A. RED GALA COST: \$2,000 TIMELINE: Q3

Staff will seek to re-establish the RED Gala as an economic development showcase event focused on bringing together stakeholders in regional economic development, provided gathering limitations do not impede mass gathering events in the Fall of 2022. Specific focus areas include promoting the Almaguin brand, celebrating regional economic and community development success stories, and networking. Staff will pursue the financial, planning and marketing assistance of regional support organizations to host the event.

Re: 2022 Municipal Levy

Your 2022 Municipal Levy Information Package is attached. The 2022 cost-shared budget was prepared based on the 2021 provincially approved funding including provincial mitigation funding for 2021, with an increase of 3.28% in the levy.

The mitigation funding from the Province covers the additional municipal cost due to the change in the costsharing formula to 30 municipal / 70 provincial. This change would have resulted in a 42% increase in the levy. The Province provided this transition funding to eliminate the 2022 increase for municipalities. It also covers the reduction to the base funding of \$369,710 that was also introduced at that time.

There is no indication at this time that there will be further transitional funding in 2023, so it would be prudent for municipalities to plan for an approximate 50% increase in 2023 on a similar shareable base of \$17,056,938.

The years 2020 and 2021 were extraordinary ones for public health, and uncertainty persists in 2022, as the fight against COVID-19 continues. Understandably, the pandemic has interrupted discussions with the Province about public health modernization, so no new information is available on this topic.

It is more important than ever for the Health Unit to stay focused on our mission "to foster healthy living within our communities by preventing illness, promoting healthy choices, and providing trusted support and information". This year's budget allows this important work to continue at the current level. In 2021, the Health Unit received approximately \$4.3 Million in COVID funding by the province. In 2022, a similar request will be made for 100% provincial funding to cover the costs of COVID-19 that cannot be funded through cost-shared mandatory funding.

1.08 Reserved Rights of the Municipality of Magnetawan

The Municipality of Magnetawan reserves the right to:

- a. make public the names of any or all Bidders and their quoted price:

1.10 Proposal Expiry Date

Bidders hereby acknowledge that their Proposals shall be irrevocable for a period of **90 days** from the Proposal submission deadline. Extensions to this period may be granted with the mutual agreement of the Municipality of Magnetawan and the successful Bidder and may be initiated by either party.

1.11 Confidentiality and Ownership

Any information provided to the Bidder by the Municipality of Magnetawan before, during or after the project is completed shall be treated as confidential and shall not be used or communicated by the Bidder or any third party in any way unless otherwise identified or permitted by the Municipality of Magnetawan. The information, reports, documentation, plans, etc. that are produced by the successful Bidder in response to this project shall become the exclusive property of the Municipality of Magnetawan; however, intellectual property, such as specific tools, templates, processes, etc. that the Bidder provides as part of the deliverables remains the property of the Bidder.

1.12 Invoicing

Section 2 Scope of Work and Project Requirements

2.01 Municipality of Magnetawan Description

The Municipality of Magnetawan is situated in the east portion of the District of Parry Sound in the Province of Ontario and has a land area of approximately 530 square kilometres and a population of approximately 1,450 (2011). The roof area to be repaired/replaced is located on the building containing the Municipal Office and Community Centre with a municipal address of 4304 ON-520.

2.02 Project Background & Scope

Due to ongoing issues with leakage and ice build-up on the existing roof area over the municipal office building, the Municipality of Magnetawan requested a review of the structure by an engineering firm to assist in determining the cause(s) and options for correcting the problems. Based upon the review of both the existing roof construction and the building design documents, it was determined that the root cause of the ice damming on this roof structure was not from a single source but was the result of a combination of factors including poor ventilation, inadequate or poorly installed insulation and excess heat entry into the attic spaces. The existing roof is a combination type with trusses on two ends and a rafter section in the middle portion of one side to allow for a 2nd level mezzanine below. Overall roof area on this portion of the building is approximately 5,000 sq.ft. and is finished with plywood sheathing covered with exposed fastener galvanized steel roofing. Roof pitch at the front portion is 3:12 with a pitch of 0.5:12 at the rear section. Due to the nature of the existing roof construction, it was suggested that the most logical solution would be to install a hybrid secondary roof over the existing composed of 2" of spray foam insulation onto the existing metal roof along with dimensional lumber sleepers (2"x6" on edge) over framed onto the existing structure with a secondary metal roof finish on top. With a minimum extension of the joists of 3" beyond the spray foam, an unobstructed ventilation space from the eaves to the peak would be created. Structural capacity of the existing roof has been evaluated and maximum additional roof dead load up to 10 lbs/sq.ft. can be added.

Contractors are also requested to provide an additional and separate proposal for extending the sleepers and secondary metal roofing only over the adjacent community centre roof area. This roof does not have the same insulation and ice damming issues but does have some minor leaks. The extended roof area would prevent a step between the two roof areas and maintain a uniform roof appearance over the entire building. Total roof area over this portion of the building is approximately 7,650 sq.ft. with similar roof slopes as noted above.

The Municipality is willing to entertain additional options with respect to the most economical methods of correcting the ongoing issues and bidding contractors are encouraged to present alternative options as part of their proposal package.

2.03 Required Services

The services to be provided by the successful Bidder will include but not be limited to those areas as set out below. 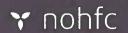


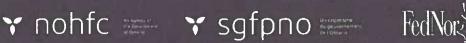

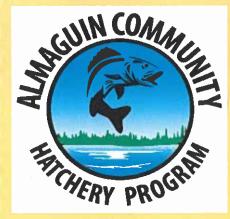

BY-LAW NO. 2022 -

Being a By-law to establish a Committee of Adjustment for the Municipality of Magnetawan for 2022

WHEREAS Section 44(1) of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter P.13, authorizes a municipality to constitute and appoint a Committee of Adjustment;

AND WHEREAS Section 44(3) of the Planning Act, R.S.O. 1990, Chapter P.13, the members of the committee who are members of a municipal council shall be appointed annually;

AND WHEREAS Section 45 (1) The committee of adjustment, upon the application of the owner of any land, building or structure affected by any by-law that is passed under section 34 or 38, or a predecessor of such sections, or any person authorized in writing by the owner, may, despite any other Act, authorize such minor variance from the provisions of the by-law, in respect of the land, building or structure or the use thereof, as in its opinion is desirable for the appropriate development or use of the land, building or structure, if in the opinion of the committee the general intent and purpose of the by-law and of the official plan, if any, are maintained;

AND WHEREAS Section 45 (3) A council that has constituted a committee of adjustment may by by-law empower the committee of adjustment to grant minor variances from the provisions of any by-law of the municipality that implements an official plan, or from such by-laws of the municipality as are specified and that implement an official plan, and when a committee of adjustment is so empowered subsection (1) applies with necessary modifications. R.S.O. 1990, c. P.13, s. 45 (3);

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Municipality of Magnetawan hereby enacts as follows:

- 1. **THAT** the following persons, all of whom are members of Council, are hereby appointed as its members for the 2022 calendar year until the inauguration of the newly elected Council:
 - Sam Dunnett
 - Tim Brunton
 - John Hetherington
 - Brad Kneller
 - Wayne Smith
- 2. THAT the Committee of Adjustment shall be hereby empowered with the authority to grant minor variances from the provisions of any by-law of the municipality that implements an Official Plan.
- 3. That the Clerk of the Municipality of Magnetawan is hereby appointed as the Secretary-Treasurer of the Committee of Adjustment. The Clerk may delegate to any employee of the Municipality of Magnetawan all, or a portion of, the duties of Secretary-Treasurer of the Committee of Adjustment.
- 4. THAT this By-law shall come into force and effect on January 01, 2022.

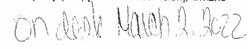
