Magnetawan Fall Fair Rules and Regulations

- 1. <u>Please carefully read ALL Rules and Regulations, Tips for Preparing for Fair Competition, as well as individual descriptions for each Article in a Class, and abide by these guidelines when preparing your Exhibits for entering.</u>
- 2. An annual Membership to the Magnetawan Agricultural Society is required for all Exhibitors in our Fall Fair, at a cost of \$5.00/year. Young Members age 17 and under may exhibit at no annual fee.
- 3. The cost of the Adult Membership Fee will be retained from all prize winners 18 years and over, for the following year and you will receive a membership card along with your prize payout.
- 4. A membership card admits one (1) member to the grounds and must be shown to the Gate Keeper upon entry.
- 5. A New Exhibitor is defined as a brand New Member that has never exhibited as an adult at the Magnetawan Fall Fair.
- 6. Exhibitors must pre-register the exhibits they are entering in our Fall Fair. Completed Registration and Waiver forms must both be submitted to the Secretary prior to Wednesday before the Fall Fair weekend. Absolutely NO Registration forms will be accepted on the Exhibit drop-off date (which is the Thursday before the Fall Fair).
- 7. The Hall will be open the Thursday of Fall Fair weekend, from 12am (noon) to 8pm to receive exhibits for judging. All exhibits for judging must be in the Hall on the **Thursday evening by 8pm sharp**. All exhibits for the Hall shall be handed over **at the door** to the Directors in charge and these Directors alone shall have the authority to place the exhibits in their place in the Hall. **Absolutely no Exhibitors are allowed into the main exhibiting area at this time**.
- 8. All exhibits of manufactured articles, handicrafts and home craft must be made personally by and be the property of the Exhibitor, and no Article may be exhibited for more than two (2) years.
- 9. The Article itself will be judged, not the container, unless Article description states otherwise.
- 10. No person shall exhibit more than one (1) entry per Article in the Hall exhibits.
- 11. Classes 1 through 12 are Adult Classes and you must be 18 years or older to exhibit in them. Class 13 is a Senior Class and you must be 60 years or older to exhibit in this Class. Classes 14 through 16 are Junior Classes and you must be 17 years or younger to exhibit in them. Class 17 is a Junior Open Class and any Junior 17 years or younger can exhibit within this Class. If the Class additionally states age categories within the Class, the Junior Member must only exhibit within their appropriate age category.
 - The Open Class and Classes 18 through 25 are open for all ages to enter.
- 12. Articles that state they are OAAS Competition items, please ensure you carefully read and follow the additional OAAS rules and regulations which are included separately in the Prize Book.
- 13. The Hall will open from 9am to 4pm on the Saturday of Fall Fair weekend for the public to view Exhibits.
- 14. Absolutely no Exhibits may be removed prior to 4pm on the Saturday of Fall Fair weekend.
- 15. The Prize List is subject to corrections, typographical errors and/or omissions. In case of a disagreement, the ruling of the Board of Directors shall be final.

- 16. The Directors will take every reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of Articles sent to the Fair, but they wish it to be distinctly understood that the Owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting Articles. Should any Article(s) be accidentally damaged, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all the assistance in their power towards the recovery of same, but will make no payment for the injured, lost or stolen Article(s).
- 17. All livestock entered for exhibition must be the property of the person in whose name it is entered, at least one month prior to the Fair.
- 18. All livestock must be on the grounds no later than 11am on the Saturday of Fall Fair weekend and must remain on the grounds until 4pm or until permission is given by a Director to remove them.
- 19. No Judge can be an Exhibitor in a Class in which he/she is the Judge. The decision of the Judges in all Classes is final. Any exceptions to this must be directed to the Director in charge of the Class.
- 20. Judging will commence at 9am on the Friday of Fall Fair weekend. Only Judges, Directors and assigned Volunteers will be allowed in the Hall during judging.
- 21. Any person who attempts to interfere with or influence the Judge while they are in the discharge of their duties, or who shall at any time on the premises of the Society, use any contemptuous or abusive language to a Judge or within his/her hearing, in consequences of any award made by the Judge, shall forfeit his right to any premiums to which he might otherwise be entitled, and may be precluded from exhibiting for one (1) year thereafter. Judges are particularly requested to report any offence(s) in this direction.
- 22. Any Member violating the Rules of the Society will be liable to forfeit his/her prize money.
- 23. The Directors will be responsible for the payout of prize money only to the extent that the revenue of the Society will permit. A percentage on the dollar will be paid to balance the budget if receipts are not sufficient to meet liabilities.
- 24. All cheques for Exhibit prize payouts will be issued at our annual Awards Night. Our Treasurer asks that you promptly cash those cheques, to facilitate year end closeout of the Society's financial books.
- 25. All protests must be verbally reported to the Secretary within 24 hours after the Saturday of Fall Fair weekend. If the protest is not resolved, a written protest, stating the cause of the complaint or appeal, and a deposit of \$5.00 must be given to the Society. The \$5.00 deposit will be forfeited to the Society if the protest is not sustained.
- 26. In the case of a prize payment conflict, please present both your entry tag and entry list to the Secretary.
- 27. The Secretary of the Magnetawan Agricultural Society retains a list of names, phone numbers and addresses of all Members for the sole purpose of forwarding prize money and Fair related information. The names are not given out for any other purpose.

- Objective: to create one 12½" x 12½" unfinished quilt block in your choice of Star Pattern, to be judged.
- You must register for this competition in advance by emailing magnetawanfair@gmail.com with the subject line "Star Quilt Block Challenge".

Registration deadline is Wednesday, April 3rd, 2024

- Registration will be limited to the first 24 email registrations received.
- After registration confirmation, you will be instructed as to where you can pick up a package of material that you are to use to make your Star Pattern 12½" x 12½"quilt block.

Material pickup date is Wednesday, April 10th, 2024 ONLY.

- You may only use the material supplied to you to create your Star Pattern quilt block.
- Your completed Star Pattern quilt block entry must be returned to us on Saturday, April 27th ONLY.
- Judging will take place the following week.
- Judging criteria:
 - -40% creativity in Star Pattern design
 - -30% use of fabric supplied for visual effect in the design
 - -30% quality of workmanship
- All quilt blocks become the property of the Magnetawan Agricultural Society.
- After the competition the quilt blocks will be sewn together and quilted to make a baby quilt(s) that will be donated to infants in need.

The following criteria will be used in the judging process:

- <u>Design</u> 25 points for creativity and originality
- Selection, Arrangement and use of Plant Material 25 points for diversity, suitability and sustainability
- <u>Condition and Maintenance</u> 15 points for overall cleanliness, tidiness and good state of repair of property
- <u>Hard Landscaping and Features</u> 15 points for condition of driveway, walkways, patios and other hard surfaces. Appropriate use of stone, rock, walls, fencing, statuary, garden art, containers, water features, outdoor structures and furniture
- <u>Environmental Practices</u> 10 points for use of good environmental practices. IE: mulches, compost etc., water management, good use of beneficial and native species
- <u>Community Contribution</u> 10 points for how the property contributes to the beautification of the neighborhood and the environmental health of the community

- Entries must be registered with the Secretary by August 10^{th,} 2024 for judging on August 17th 2024

To enter: email magnetawanfair@gmail.com and include your full name, address and telephone number. The following criteria will be used in the judging process:

- <u>Vegetable Garden Composition</u> 25 points for overall variety of vegetables being grown, number of vegetable plants per variety.
- <u>Arrangement</u> 25 points for vegetable garden sizing, consideration for Spring harvesting plants, Summer harvesting plants and Fall harvesting plants, allowances for vine plants, ground spreading plants as well as appropriate space for vegetables that grow above and below the soil.
- <u>Condition and Maintenance</u> 15 points for overall cleanliness, tidiness and visual arrangement of vegetable species.
- Garden Features 15 points for appropriate use of fencing, flower edging and garden art. Could be a combination of flat garden beds, raised garden beds and/or planter use.
- <u>Environmental Practices</u> 15 points for use of good environmental practices with mulches, compost and irrigation techniques.
- <u>Community Contribution</u> 5 points for how the property contributes to the beautification of the neighborhood and the environmental health of the community.

Class 2 Vegetables

Tips for Preparing Vegetables for Fair Competition

- All exhibits in the Vegetables Class must be grown by the Exhibitor.
- All entries are to be displayed on plain white paper plates unless noted otherwise.
- Beans and peas, matched, fresh and a portion of the stem attached.
- Carrots and parsnips, tops removed approximately 1/2" above the crown. Taproot left on. Roots may be washed.
- Yellow, red, white and Spanish onions, root removed just below the base of the bulb, but not peeled. Dirty outer scales removed and tops cut off about 1" above the bulb.
- Pickling onions with a diameter of about 3/4", well matched, firm, with clear skin, bright and clean.

- Beets, tops removed approximately 1/2" above the crown. Wipe the beet clean. Trim the root to about 1".
- Corn, well filled kernels, closely spaced and well rounded. Remove 1/3 of the husk and the silk from the tip to the butt.
- Cauliflower heads, firm and well formed. Lower leaves to remain around the head, trimmed across, leaving 1/2" to 1" projecting above the head. The stem should be cut off at 1/4" to 1/2" from the lower leaves.
- Broccoli, dense and well formed. Lower leaves removed from the stalk and displayed in a jar with about 2" of water.
- Cabbage, firm and well formed. Head trimmed down to two layers of outer leaves and stem no longer than 1/2".
- Squash, stem attached and neatly trimmed. The squash may be washed. Only a minimum of light color found on the underside.
- Turnips, tops and roots trimmed off.
- Potatoes, brushed clean.
- Kale and celery, displayed in a jar with 2" of water.

- Only one vegetable of each variety to be shown.
- Suitably displayed in a container of your choice, not exceeding 24" square.

65. Collection of Vine Vegetables and/or Vine Fruits

- Minimum of 5 different vine vegetables/fruits in the display.
- Only one variety of each vine vegetable and/or vine fruit to be shown.
- Each vine vegetable and/or vine fruit must have a name card attached as to their variety.
- Suitably displayed in a container of your choice, not exceeding 24" in either length or width.

- All potted plants must be the property of the Exhibitor at least 1 year prior to exhibiting.

Stan Darling Trophy for Family Achievement

The purpose of this trophy is to encourage family groups to work together towards a common goal in Agricultural Fairs and to provide recognition of their achievement. The trophy shall be presented to the family group winning the highest number of points at each annual Fair. If any family group wins the trophy three times, a permanent plaque will be awarded and the trophy will remain in competition. In the event of a tie in points, the winner shall be the family with the greatest number of 1st prizes. In the event of a dispute, the decision of the Directors of the Society shall be final.

If your family group is competing for this trophy, please identify <u>ALL family last names on the Fall Fair Entry</u> <u>Form.</u> Each individual can ONLY belong to ONE family group.

Class 18 Cattle Displays

The purpose of these displays is to provide an educational exhibit for the public attending the Fall Fair. A remuneration of \$85 per animal will be paid to each Exhibitor.

RULES: Each Exhibitor must display animals in a clean condition and halter broken. A display board is to accompany each display to provide pertinent information regarding breed, origin of breed, qualities, approximate birth weights, approximate mature weights, calving ease, milk production and identifying color and/or features. An attendant must be with the display from 12:00pm (noon) to 3:00pm on the day of the Fall Fair, to be available to answer any questions the public may have.

1. Beef Cattle:

A display is to consist of **one to three** animals. The animals must be manageable and able to be handled such that the safety of the Exhibitor and Bystanders are not put at risk.

2. Dairy Cattle:

A display is to consist of **one to three** animals. The animals must be manageable and able to be handled such that the safety of the Exhibitor and Bystanders are not put at risk.

Class 19 Goat Displays

The purpose of these displays is to provide an educational exhibit for the public attending the Fall Fair. A remuneration of \$40 per animal (to a maximum of \$160) will be paid to each Exhibitor.

RULES: Each Exhibitor must display animals in a clean condition, manageable and penned on the grounds. A display board is to accompany each display to provide pertinent information regarding breed, origin of breed, qualities, kidding information, milk and meat production and identifying color and/or features. An attendant must be with the display from 12:00pm (noon) to 3:00pm on the day of the Fall Fair, to be available to answer any questions the public may have.

1. A display is to consist of **one to four** animals.

Class 20 Sheep Displays

The purpose of these displays is to provide an educational exhibit for the public attending the Fall Fair. A remuneration of \$40 per animal (to a maximum of \$160) will be paid to each Exhibitor.

RULES: Each Exhibitor must display animals in a clean condition, manageable and penned on the grounds. A display board is to accompany each display to provide pertinent information regarding breed, origin of breed, qualities, lambing information, milk and meat production and identifying color and/or features. An attendant must be with the display from 12:00pm (noon) to 3:00pm on the day of the Fall Fair, to be available to answer any questions the public may have.

1. A display is to consist of **one to four** animals.

Class 21 Swine Displays

The purpose of these displays is to provide an educational exhibit for the public attending the Fall Fair. A remuneration of \$60 per animal (to a maximum of \$120) will be paid to each Exhibitor.

RULES: Each Exhibitor must display animals in a clean condition, manageable and penned on the grounds. A display board is to accompany each display to provide pertinent information regarding breed, origin of breed, qualities, farrowing information, meat production and identifying color and/or features. An attendant must be with the display from 12:00pm (noon) to 3:00pm on the day of the Fall Fair, to be available to answer any questions the public may have.

1. A display is to consist of **one to two** animals.

Class 22 Poultry Displays

The purpose of these displays is to provide an educational exhibit for the public attending the Fall Fair.

Remuneration: Categories 1 to 4 - \$20 per display

Categories 5, 6, 8 and 10 - \$25 per display

Category 7 - \$30 per display Category 9 - \$35 per display

RULES: Each Exhibitor (all ages) must display the birds in a clean condition, manageable and penned on the grounds. A display board is to accompany each display to provide pertinent information regarding breed, origin of breed and identifying color and/or features. An attendant must be with the display from 12:00pm (noon) to 3:00pm on the day of the Fall Fair, to be available to answer any questions the public may have.

- 1. A display is to consist of **(two)** a pair of chickens raised for the purpose of egg production that lay white eggs, a female and male if possible.
- 2. A display is to consist of **(two) a pair** of chickens raised for the purpose of egg production that lay **brown** eggs, a female and male if possible.
- 3. A display is to consist of **(two)** a pair of chickens raised for the purpose of meat production, a female and male if possible.
- 4. A display is to consist of (two) a pair of miniature chickens, a female and male if possible.
- 5. A display is to consist of **(two) a pair** of any variety of turkey, a female and male if possible.
- 6. A display is to consist of (two) a pair of pheasants, a female and male if possible.
- 7. A display is to consist of (two) a pair of geese, a female and male if possible.
- 8. A display is to consist of (two) a pair of ducks, a female and male if possible.
- 9. A display is to consist of **one to two** peacocks, a female and male if possible.
- 10. A display is to consist of **one female with two or more young** from any of the poultry displays listed from 1-9 above.

Class 23 Rabbit/Guinea Pig Displays

The purpose of these displays is to provide an educational exhibit for the public attending the Fall Fair. A remuneration of \$15 per animal will be paid to each Exhibitor.

RULES: Each Exhibitor must display the animals in a clean condition, manageable and penned on the grounds. A display board is to accompany each display to provide pertinent information regarding breed, origin of breed, qualities and identifying color and/or features. An attendant must be with the display from 12:00pm (noon) to 3:00pm on the day of the Fall Fair, to be available to answer any questions the public may have.

- 1. A display is to consist of one female rabbit with two or more young
- 2. A display is to consist of **one to two Dwarf Rabbits**
- 3. A display is to consist of **one to two rabbits** any other variety
- 4. A display is to consist of one to two Guinea Pigs

Class 24 Horse Displays

The purpose of these displays is to provide an educational exhibit for the public attending the Fall Fair.

RULES: Each Exhibitor must display the animals in a clean and healthy condition. The animals must be manageable and able to be handled such that the safety of the Exhibitor and Bystanders are not put at risk.

1. Light Riding Horses:

A display is to consist of **one to four** light riding horses with a remuneration of \$60 per animal (to a maximum of \$240).

2. Draft Horses:

A display is to consist of **one team** of draft horses in harness with a remuneration of \$150.

3. Draft Ponies:

A display is to consist of one team of draft ponies in harness with a remuneration of \$150.

Class 25 Alpaca/Llama Displays

The purpose of these displays is to provide an educational exhibit for the public attending the Fall Fair. A remuneration of \$40 per animal (to a maximum of \$160) will be paid to each Exhibitor.

RULES: Each Exhibitor must display animals in a clean condition, manageable and penned on the grounds. A display board is to accompany each display to provide pertinent information regarding breed, origin of breed, qualities, birthing information, wool quality and identifying color and/or features. An attendant must be with the display from 12:00pm (noon) to 3:00pm on the day of the Fall Fair, to be available to answer any questions the public may have.

1. A display is to consist of **one to four** animals.

GENERAL COMPETITION RULES

(Note: there are no photography district competitions for 2024)

Rules

- 1. Competition is open to all exhibitors of member societies of the OAAS.
- 2. All work on the entry must be completed by the exhibitor entering the competition.
- 3. By entering an OAAS competition, the exhibitor agrees to allow their name and exhibit to be part of any promotional activities related to the competition.
- 4. Post the District/Provincial Competition Rules in your fair prize book or provide the OAAS competition website location.

District Competition

- 5. Each local fair is entitled to send one entry into each category of the District Competition. In the case where the fair is unable to send the 1st place winner to the district meeting, then the 2nd place winner will be eligible to enter.
- 6. Judging at the District Competitions is the responsibility of each OAAS District. Prize money to be paid by the district.
- 7. All district entries must be registered on the relevant OAAS Championship Entry Form, and returned to the OAAS Convention Administrator, by December 1st.

Provincial Competition

- Each district is entitled to send one entry into each category of the Provincial Competition. In the case
 where the district is unable to send the 1st place winner to the convention, then the 2nd place winner is
 eligible to enter.
- Judges who officiate the Competition at the Annual Convention will be appointed by the OAAS.
- 3. All entries must be received for judging by the Competition Committee in the designated area by 5pm on the Thursday afternoon of the Annual Convention of the OAAS. Please retain the ticket issued, to claim the entry when the viewing rooms close.
- 4. A number is assigned to each entry. Entries are only identified by this number during the judging process.
- 5. Please remove all tags, ribbons, or any other fair/exhibition identification from the entries.
- 6. No persons other than the judges and designated officials will be permitted to enter the designated judging room until after the judging and winners have been announced.
- 7. Any exhibitor or any person acting on behalf of the exhibitor who violates any of the Rules and Regulations or who interferes with the judges or the judging process, shall be disqualified and the entry will be removed from the competition.
- 8. No entry may be removed from the display area until the official closing of the viewing room and designated time of pick up.
- 9. The OAAS shall not be held liable for any loss occasioned by fire, theft, accident or the negligence of other exhibitors, officials or otherwise.
- 10. Any protests must be made to the Competition Committee of the OAAS in writing within 5 working days after the last day of the convention.
- 11. All entries will be judged using the OAAS Judging Standards. Copies of the OAAS Judging Standards can be purchased from the OAAS store at https://oaasfairs.org/agricultural-society-info/store.



BUTTER TART COMPETITION

(no fruit, no nuts)

Rules

- 1. Please review the General Competition Rules document.
- 2. Entry must be made solely by the person entering the competition. (including the pastry)
- 3. Number of butter tarts to be shown at local fair/exhibition to be determined by each individual fair/exhibition.

District Competition

- 1. A total of 6 tarts will be required to be shown. Tarts must be on a clean, sturdy plate (no paper plates) inside of a clear plastic bag with the exhibitor's name, mailing address and fair represented.
- 2. The size of the tarts must be full size tarts. (no mini or bite size tarts) and must not contain fruit or nuts (ie. no raisins, no pecans)
- 3. If the exhibitor has won at more than one fair, the one closest to the exhibitor's home address is the agricultural society from which the entry will be sent to the district competition. The other agricultural societies may send their second place winner into the district competition. An exhibitor may only enter into one district competition.

Provincial Competition

- 1. A total of 6 tarts will be required to be shown. Tarts must be on a clean, sturdy plate (no paper plates) inside of a clear plastic bag with the exhibitor's name, mailing address and district represented.
- 2. The size of the tarts must be full size tarts. (no mini or bite size tarts) and must not contain fruit or nuts (ie. no raisins, no pecans).
- 3. 1st and 2nd place entries will not be returned to exhibitor but will be placed up for auction at the convention.

HAND QUILTED COMPETITION

Rules:

- 1. Please review the General Competition Rules document.
- 2. The quilt must be solely made, and hand quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition.
- 3. Quilts to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches. Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All 4 sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.
- 4. The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.
- 5. The winning OAAS Hand Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future OAAS fair, district and/or provincial competitions.
- 6. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules.

District Competition

- 7. Each local fair is entitled to send their best of show of all eligible hand quilts to the district competition.
- 8. If the fair's best of show hand quilt has won at more than one fair, the exhibitor must consider their own agricultural society as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the district meeting, otherwise it should be sent from the agricultural society nearest his/her home address. The other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, may enter their second best of show hand quilt into the district competition.
- 9. An exhibitor who wins more than one best of show title with different hand quilts at different fairs is entitled to enter each winning quilt in the district competition.
- 10. If an exhibitor is exhibiting in more than one district, they are entitled to enter different winning quilts at different district competitions but cannot enter the same quilt at more than one district competition.
- 11. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning hand guilts at each district competition.
- 12. A photo of the top three placed hand quilts at the district competition must accompany the "OAAS Championship Quilt Entry Form"

Provincial Competition

- 13. A \$500.00 GRAND PRIZE and rosette will be awarded. The exhibitor will retain ownership of the guilt.
- 14. A \$100 RESERVE GRAND PRIZE will be awarded. The exhibitor will retain ownership of the guilt.

MACHINE QUILTED COMPETITION

Rules:

- 1. Please review the General Competition Rules document.
- 2. The quilt must be solely made, and machine quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition.
- 3. Quilts to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches. Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All 4 sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.
- 4. The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.
- 5. The winning OAAS Machine Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future OAAS fair, district and/or provincial competitions.
- 6. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules.
- 7. The use of domestic, mid arm and/or long arm equipment is permitted on hand or computer guided machine quilt entries.

District Competition

- 1. Each local fair is entitled to send their best of show of all eligible machine quilts to the district competition.
- 2. If the fair's best of show machine quilt classes has won at more than one fair, the exhibitor must consider their own agricultural society as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the district meeting, otherwise it should be sent from the agricultural society nearest his/her home address. The other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, may enter their second best of show machine quilt in the district competition.
- 3. An exhibitor who wins more than one best of show title with different machine quilts at different fairs is entitled to enter each winning quilt in the district competition.
- 4. If an exhibitor is exhibiting in more than one district, they are entitled to enter different winning quilts at different district competitions but cannot enter the same quilt at more than one district competition.
- 5. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning machine guilts at each district competition.
- 6. A photo of the top three placed machine quilts at the district competition must accompany the "OAAS Championship Quilt Entry Form"

Provincial Competition

- 7. All quilts entered in the competition must be machine quilted.
- 8. A \$500.00 GRAND PRIZE and rosette will be awarded. The exhibitor will retain ownership of the guilt.
- 9. A \$100 RESERVE GRAND PRIZE will be awarded. The exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.

Each agricultural society is entitled to send their best of show to the district competition.

If the exhibitor has won at more than one fair, the one closest to the exhibitor's home address is the agricultural society from which the entry will be sent to the district competition. The other agricultural societies may send their second place winner into the district competition. An exhibitor may only enter into one district competition. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning entries at each district competition.

Provincial Competition

Maple syrup exhibits shall consist of two (2) curved Kent style glass bottles (D&G #505188 Syrup Bottle with Handle), or equivalent, of Maple Syrup, Canada Grade A - Amber, each having a capacity of 250 mL.

Entries must be labelled on the BOTTOM of the containers only with a supplied entry number or identifier. No other labels will be permitted.

All maple syrup should have a flavour characteristic of its respective colour class and be free from any objectionable odour or taste. It is best to sample from the same lot before submitting your entries to the OAAS.

Any maple syrup entry containing any form of foreign material will be disqualified from the competition.

Maple syrup will be judged using the standards published by the OAAS in *Agriculture & Horticulture Judging Standards for Ontario Fairs.* An approved maple syrup colorimeter will be used to assess the colour.

1st and 2nd place entries will be placed up for auction at the convention. Other entries will be returned.
